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


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
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Three seasons in one

Village Directory and Welcome Pack

The Parish Plan identified a desire for better information to residents and visitors about village amenities and for help to newcomers to become involved in the community life of Barrow.

The Barrow Voice Team, under the umbrella of the Community Association, plans to address these two issues by creating a Welcome Pack which will be given to every new resident of the Willow Way development (and other newcomers) as they move in. It will also be available free as a Barrow Directory to any existing resident who would like a copy. The Welcome Pack and Directory will be based on an updated and expanded version of Who Goes, the guide to community groups which the Community Association has produced in the past. You will find lots of extra information about village facilities and amenities and hopefully, it will be a really useful source of local information. The Barrow Directory will also be available in a down-loadable version on the village website, www.barrowuponsoar.org.uk

We have been successful in gaining funding for this project and we aim to have the Welcome Pack and Directory printed by the end of September. Aerial Photo (front cover)

This aerial photo was taken by Peter Stephens of Birch Avenue on a flight in a light aircraft early in the summer. 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Archaeological Finds at Willow Way

In the last Barrow Voice, the archaeologist responsible for checking the Willow Way development, Danny McAree, asked for anybody who had information of the lime working in Barrow. Here's why..

It is a condition of new building developments that the developer must pay for a detailed archaeological examination of the site. This is to record anything of importance before it is destroyed by the building work. Danny McAree of the Northamptonshire Archaeological Service led the excavation.

Figure I is an aerial photograph of the site, spanning two fields either side of Strancliffe Lane. Some parts of the site have had the topsoil stripped off to enable Danny and his team to see and get at the archaeology underneath. Danny will be writing a report, which we will see in a few months time and he is also offering to give us a presentation on his work at Willow Way. This article is a taster based on conversations with Danny about the areas marked A, B and C in fig. 1.

Area A revealed remains of what Danny thinks is an Iron Age hut surrounded by small fields. Other such huts have been found in Barrow, showing that people have lived here for thousands of years. In the centre of the hut was found a burnt and broken stone. Despite the fact that the period is known as the Iron Age, few people could afford iron, so they would mostly cook in pottery bowls filled with water, which they boiled with stones heated in the fire - the origin of 'pot boiler'!

In Area B they found red circles of burnt soil, along with traces of coal. Not a lot to see as you notice in fig. 2, and these have since been built over.

These burnt circles are the remains of an early form of lime kiln also known as "sod" or "clamp " kilns, and are evidence of small-scale lime workings in the Middle Ages. Maybe a few men would rent a field and dig for limestone which, locally, was about 3-4 metres below ground. They dug out the limestone ("delved" for it) and made a simple kiln nearby. This was made by digging a small, round hole which was filled with kindling and coal, then covered with limestone and sods of turf in alternate layers and lit. It would have smouldered for days before the limestone was sufficiently dry to become quicklime for use as a kind of fertiliser on their fields, or as mortar for building.

Area C is the most exciting. Here Danny found the limekiln shown in fig.3. This is a sophisticated type of kiln, which may have been used in the mid-1800s (exact dating awaited). Peter Yates is shown in the photo to give it scale! The half that has survived shows the cone shape: Danny suspects that the top half was an inverted cone, so that the whole thing would have looked like an egg. Steps lead down to the base where Peter's standing. The kiln was lined with bricks - the "eggshell" - but most of these have been removed and possibly reused, when the kiln was no longer needed. So, what you see is the mould of the kiln, like a giant fossil. It was surrounded and supported by quarry waste backfilled around the brick lining. You can also see the vertical slots in the walls. These are the remains of internal flues, taking heat up into the middle of the kiln. This one would have been loaded from an open hole at the top, alternating with layers of coal and limestone. A fire was lit at the bottom and the burning controlled so that the fire did not escape from the top. As the limestone dried and crumbled, it was

removed at the base, so more coal and limestone could be tipped in at the top. This type of kiln was kept burning for weeks as a continuous process, and would produce a very high grade quicklime.

Another kiln of the later style was found nearer Cotes Road, between Strancliffe Lane and Brooker's Nursery (fig. 4), which to the kiln You

shows the approach to the kiln. You can see the steep ramp, revetted each side by rough stone and brick walls which were usually removed before the abandonment and backfilling of the kiln. These bricks were often reused on the next kiln.


[Other types of kiln were found, but did not photograph satisfactorily, so we have not described them here] The surprising fact is that Danny found over 30 kilns, of at least 4 types, in these two fields. Together they show that limestone was being worked in Barrow over many centuries. Apparently, they are intriguing kiln specialists, as ours are a little different from most other kilns found around the country. Danny is convinced that other fields - if explored as thoroughly - would show similar evidence of lime-working. What's more, although we have maps of old lime-workings around Barrow, most of the kilns found so far are NOT shown on the maps! So there must be more out there, waiting to be found. That's why Danny is asking for any information we can give him such as old photos or memories of the kilns. The information might help him piece together missing details -like was the kiln really as egg-shaped as he thinks? He is away in China for a while, looking at the terracotta army, so this could give you time to recollect anything. If you do remember, please contact me (Terri Davies, Archaeology Warden, 18, Cotes Rd.) and I can pass it all on to Danny. Thank you in advance.

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
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Traptastic Music

'On behalf of myself and Jean I would like to thank everyone who helped with the event, from glass collectors to performers and fundraisers. In particular, thanks must go to Dave from AC-DC Entertainments for the loan of the stage, to Vern Wager for his magnificent fundraising efforts and to the originator and organiser of the event, Malcolm Wagg. Both Vern and Malcolm have done the job for the last four years and are now taking a back seat for a well-earned rest. Also, special thanks to all our 25 sponsors and everyone who bought raffle tickets.

'We raised at least $\pm 5,500$ this year, giving a total of $\pm 20,500$ over the past four years. However, with Vern's departure we desperately need someone to co-ordinate and take a leading role in the fundraising effort. 'The money this year was split between The Air Ambulance, Wish Upon A Star and Barrow Youth Theatre. Youth

A small team of determined volunteers is currently focusing on finding out what our teenage residents would most appreciate in the way of leisure activities and facilities. Sports

In the June edition of Barrow Voice, the Sports Action Group reported its considerable interest in the latest attempts by Humphrey Perkins High School to build a Sports Hall on school premises. The Governors have made it quite clear that such a facility would be available for use by the community when not in use by the school. In our report, we noted the importance of dialogue between the School Governors and members of the community in the early planning stages of a multi-use Sports Hall. We are delighted to report that this idea has been welcomed and Alan Willcocks, a member of the Sports Action Group is now a member of the Sports Hall working party. The Chair of the Community Association, Judith Rodgers, who is also a Community Governor, is also part of the team. The next meeting of the Sports Action Group will be on Monday 25th September at 7.30 in the community lounge. Do come along if you are interested in influencing decisions.

Over the next few weeks and months, a lot of hard work will be put in by all concerned to try to secure matched funding to build a 'proper' sports hall that is of a high enough specification to be of great value to a wide range of sports groups. Things all sound very encouraging and exciting and perhaps, this time, Barrow really will get the sports hall that it has been seeking for so long.

Heritage

This has been slow to get off the ground due to the pressure of other things but Arthur Gardner is determined, now, to get it moving. By the time you read this we should have received a substantial grant from the Countryside Agency - about £18,500! - to undertake a range of projects in and around the village. (More about this in the Winter edition of Barrow Voice.) Arthur is going to fix a public meeting for all who might be interested in helping. Also, he wants to try and restart the 'Local Studies Society', under the auspices of the Community Association, as a forum for research and learning about local history, the environment, archaeology, or whatever. The aim is to produce guidebooks, exhibitions and the like to make people more aware of the local heritage as requested in the Parish Plan surveys.

Business Forum

Barrow upon Soar is set to become an even better place to shop and trade following the formation of the Barrow Business Forum.

The Forum has been set up with the aim of promoting Barrow as a place to do business, by ensuring that Barrow residents and other businesses know about the range of skills and services available within their village, and to give businesses a co-ordinated voice to express their views on village matters.

There are over 200 businesses which the forum is aware of operating in Barrow including all the local shops plus a wide range of other businesses providing such diverse services as sewing machine repairs, soft furnishing, accountancy, boating, web design, computer services, child care, gardening, electricians, plumbers etc, etc etc.

Traffic

Back in June of this year after the consultation period resulting from the Parish Plan, a group of villagers met at the Community Centre and in July the Barrow Traffic Action Group was formed.

The group is open to any villager who would like to see the village traffic problems improve and currently we are about 30 strong. The Plan highlighted the strong feeling amongst local residents.

Meetings are every third Tuesday in the month at the Bishop Beveridge Club, at 7.30pm.

Having a thriving business community is essential to the general well being of any village; it provides local jobs, shops - which make life easier for all residents and particularly the more vulnerable who may not have ready access to transport, not to mention local tradesmen to carry out repairs and services on properties. Using local businesses is generally easier and friendlier than having to deal with someone many miles away.

One of the first tasks of the Forum will be to produce information about businesses in Barrow for distribution to residents, including families moving to the new Willow Way development. Lists of local businesses will be available at various places around the village so, whatever you need, you should be able to find a local business to help. The aim is to also provide a mediation service so should any resident have a dispute or problem with a Forum member they can ask the Forum to intervene to try to resolve the problem - yet another reason for using a local business which is a member of the Forum.

For businesses, not only will the Forum be a cost effective way of promotion but the intention is to provide access to business advice and help and to explore the various grants and other assistance available from a variety of sources.

Barrow's Golden Couple

The Barrow Voice team would like to share with you the Golden Wedding celebrations of one of the founder team members, John Thursby. He and Joan recently celebrated their 50 years of married life surrounded by family and friends.

At 78 and 72 respectively, John and Joan haven't always lived in Barrow. John, a native of Peterborough, did his National Service in Catterick camp and post-war Germany as a radio mechanic. He says he enjoyed the experience and it led to him studying electrical engineering at Loughborough College. He reminded me that those were the days of glass valves..."how things have changed". After working for Crompton Parkinson, he moved to Brush Electrical Machines in Loughborough. He retired from Brush in 1992.

Joan was born in Dovercourt, near Harwich. At five years old, she experienced the trauma of war-time evacuation, spending two unhappy years, separated from her family and living in rural Gloucestershire. At 18, she went to Southlands teacher training college in Wimbledon to study music and arts and crafts. Her first job was infant teaching in Chelmsford, with 48 new entrants in her very first class. She commented "nursery schools and playgroups didn't exist in those days and children weren't ready for school in the way that most 5-year olds are today. Those early days were hard for children and teachers."

John met Joan at a Methodist Youth Group in Wimbledon. Joan invited the whole group to tea in Southlands, including John. They married in 1956 in Chelmsford Methodist Church, where the toast to the happy couple was made in Britvic orange! After 12 years of married life, they moved to their current house in Thirlmere Road, Barrow. Their two children, Anne and Phil, were born in Chelmsford and they now have four grandchildren, Hannah, Ross, Simon and Kieran.

Joan returned to teaching as a supply teacher at the (then) Cotes Road Barrow Infants School under Helen Lungley. She



enjoyed a number of happy years there but changes in rules governing supply teaching led her to leave teaching. She worked at Wrights in Quorn and then Barrow Health Centre as receptionist and then Practice Manager.

When I asked John and Joan to tell me about their activities in Barrow outside of work. I was unprepared for the sheer extent of their involvement, both past and present. I knew, of course, that both are "pillars of the Barrow Methodist Church". John seems to have held all possible positions at some time and is still the Property Steward and in charge of hiring. Joan has been organist for the past 35 years and also plays for funerals and weddings at Holy Trinity Church. "It's not me that's the problem with the Vidor; it's the organ" she said, wryly. She, like John, has played a key role in many church activities and is currently 'Marmalade Queen' for the monthly Methodist MiniMart. She has also been heavily involved in producing Roger Jones' Christian musicals as a combined venture of all the Barrow Churches. This will include 'Simeon' that is planned to be part of the festivities at the beginning of December, marking the start of the Christmas season.

Outside of the Church, John has also been central to many Barrow institutions. He helped in the building of the Community Centre back in the 1970s and he was the first Community Association Treasurer. He remembers collecting the $\pounds 1.00$ annual subscription from any resident who wished

to be a member. The practical problems of this system quickly led to the current practice where every resident is a member but there are no subscriptions. He has also been involved with Barrow Voice since its beginning. He was a Parish Councillor for 28 years, particularly involving himself with the management of the playing fields and Barrow Charities. He has been involved with the WEA (Workers Educational Association) since the Barrow branch was formed and he is currently Chairman. He thus helps to set up non-vocational educational classes such as local studies, archaeology, heritage and natural history. Last, but not least, every Wednesday morning, he goes off to Loughborough to manage the Barrow group of Teamprint. This organisation uses premises attached to the Methodist Church in Royland Road and prints posters, booklets, village magazines and leaflets for local community groups and charities. Charges are at cost and if you are interested in Teamprint's services or if you would like to offer help, ring John on 412467.

You can see that there's still a lot of life left in this Golden Couple. They illustrate very well the community spirit that is so strong in Barrow. If the village would benefit from a particular activity or service, they don't sit back and expect someone else to do the work; they get right into the action...and stick with it. So, "Thanks, John and Joan. You're both Barrow Champions!"

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

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


Charnwood Orchestra will give its annual concert in Holy Trinity Church on Saturday October 7th. The concert will start at 7.45pm


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A warm and caring welcome awaits your child at the OFSTED Registered Barrow Pre-School Playgroup.

And we are confident that you will still have the stamina to finish the day by enjoying the Churches Together production of 'Simeon'.


So on Saturday December 2nd, you' re going to have a busy day and there really is something for everyone, young and old.

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Bobbies on Bicycles (part 2)

Very few people contacted me personally about my item in the Summer Edition of Barrow Voice in which I suggested that perhaps there could be a collection from villagers to raise money to provide our local policeman and the police community support officer with a bicycle to get around the village more quickly. Individuals who commented said they thought the sum of £1000 was far too high. Information from Quorn Local Policing Unit about the costs indicates that a bike will cost £600 and the equipment and extra clothing required for an officer to use will cost around £400. Perhaps Inspector Yallop will be able to provide more information about the latter.

I would like to thank those who attend the monthly meeting of Barrow Neighbourhood Watch for considering whether or not to contribute to the fund for a bicycle from NHW resources, and perhaps to organise the collection of donations from villagers should it seem likely that people are prepared to donate. I have not had any response from the Parish Council to the article in Barrow Voice, so I will have make a direct contact with the council to ask what help might be available from and through the Parish Council.

When I mention the matter to some villagers the response I often receive is along the lines 'We hardly ever (never) see a policeman in the village'. I find this difficult to believe as I have seen the Police Community Support Officer very frequently in many parts of Barrow and I know he calls in at several community buildings (Bishop Beveridge Club and the Scout Headquarters for instance) quite regularly. Police cars pass me quite often - but how easy is it to make any contact with the occupant(s)? One villager suggested that our local bobbies should get about on foot more often, but I believe that on a bike they will be able to cover the village more widely and speedily and will still be able to be stopped and spoken to.

I am sure that both Andy Houghton and Nigel Ritchie would make good use of a bicycle and that we can provide somewhere secure for it to be stored in the village. Are the people of Barrow prepared to pay a small amount each in order to make this improvement in policing possible? Can we take silence as consent? I doubt it. Maybe some other residents would like to contact one or more of their parish councillors to suggest that some effort be made to raise this £1000 to get our bobbies on a bike.

Spicy Chicken Salad with Watermelon, Feta & Pumpkin Seeds

2 x Chicken Breasts Chilli Flakes & Ground Cumin Serves 4 people 4 x Spring Onions 200g Watermelon - Diced Mixed Lettuce Leaves of your Choice (I like something crunchy like Little Gem or Cos) 150g Feta cheese - diced 2 x Fresh Red Chillies 2 Tbsp Pumpkin Seeds I Bunch Fresh Mint - picked Walnut or Olive Oil to Dress

I x Lime

Season the chicken with Salt, Pepper, Chilli & Cumin and fry or roast for 12-15 minutes until thoroughly cooked. Allow to cool slightly then slice.

While the chicken is cooking, slice the spring

onion, and dice the red chilli (you can use more or less according to your preference). That's the hard work done; now you just have to put the salad together. Dress the lettuce with a little oil and arrange onto plates, then divide the other ingredients between each plate and scatter on the lettuce leaves. Finish with the pumpkin seeds, a squeeze of fresh lime juice and a little more oil. Enjoy!
