Pillings Lock Marina moves closer to completion

Plans were submitted in 2002 to extract gravel from a site down Flesh Hovel Lane, adjacent to the canal at Pillings Lock, yet I never got round to going to have a look.

At the end of last year some friends of mine who have sold their house and bought a narrow boat, informed me that they have bought a berth at the new marina which is due to open some time later this year. So I decided it was time to go and have a look.

Pillings Lock lies on the river Soar just outside Barrow, on the way to Loughborough and there is a lovely walk along the canal side, all the way to Loughborough, a place teeming with wild life and a popular area for fishermen.

Imagine my surprise when I eventually saw what used to be fields, with herds of cows sweeping majestically across them, quietly grazing, having been replaced with a huge reach of open water, accessed by boat from the canal by a narrow opening a hundred yards or so beyond the bridge over the canal to the weir and about 50 yards this side of the old turning point.



According to the project's website, which can be found at www.pillingslock.com and application (P/06/3470/2) plans submitted to Charnwood Borough Council there are to be at least 358 mooring spaces berths for a mixture of canal craft, wide and narrow boats etc with at least 80 for sale on a lease basis. There are to be shopping, shower, laundry, recreational bar & cafe and maintenance workshop facilities available for the users of the marina. There are to be car parking spaces for 56 cars on a main car park and 50 more on an overspill car park along with fishing lakes and additional wildlife habitats.

Obviously this will have an impact on the amount of traffic along the narrow lane and already a filter lane has been constructed on the approach to Flesh Hovel Lane just beyond the roundabout as you go over the A6 towards Quorn.

It will be interesting to see how the site matures to blend back into the surrounding countryside.

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Barrow & Quorn PCs disagree on Slabs' future

Since we reported in March, there have been meetings, letters, discussions, consultations but still the future of the Slabs footpath is far from being resolved. Barrow Parish Council stated in the April Parish Council minutes that it 'would deplore closure of this footpath and would support proposals for its upgrade to accommodate reclassification of the footpath as a cycle route subject to certain recommendations.' We understand that the recommendations include the retaining of the rural nature of the meadow including the avenue of Horse Chestnut trees and the slabs at both ends of the footpath even if there has to be tarmac in the middle section. If there must be lighting, then it should be at a minimum level, with heritage style lamps and switched off from midnight to at least 5.00 am.

In contrast, Quorn Parish Council has not accepted the County Council's proposals to turn the footpath into a dual footpath and cycle route. The Quorn Council does not want a fully urbanized and lit route linking Quorn and Barrow. Instead, it proposes that the Slabs footpath is retained as an improved footpath, keeping the slabs at both ends but accepting the use of tarmac in the middle stretch.

Meanwhile, Barrow Parish Council has asked the County Council to undertake a feasibility study to look at a safe route for pedestrian, cyclists and horse riders along the B675 road between Barrow and Quorn. This might well come up with an alternative path in the field beside the road which is already Country Council land.

Both Barrow & Quorn Parish Councils, I believe, reflect the concerns of many residents over the huge impact that it would have to build a wide tarmac ROAD across what is a pleasant meadow. (You ignore the pylons). And it's rather strange that, at a time when the national press are printing articles about street lights being turned off during the night to minimise our 'carbon footprint', the County Council are prepared to light up a field all night. So much for saving energy.

As stated in the last issue, the footpath is used by many pupils of both Humphrey Perkins and Rawlins going to and from school. If the footpath were to close, and pupils had to go via the roadside raised footpath, it would create a hazardous situation with many young people all using this dangerous walkway at the same time as there is heavy traffic going in and out of the village. It would also probably add 15 minutes to their journey.

I understand that both Parish Councils are very much against a closure, and will work with the County Council to reach a solution that will be in the interest of both villages. The County Council has responded quite positively to all these discussions. The Rights of Way department will be consulting widely before producing a detailed proposal. In other words, hopefully, their original stance of 'agree or we'll close it' has softened.

If you have any strong feelings about this issue please contact the editor and air your views. You should also make sure that Barrow Parish Council knows how you feel so that it can campaign to achieve a solution that is satisfactory to Barrow residents.

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SOS - Save our Slabs

Joyce Noon of CPRE asks if you care



In the spring issue of Barrow Voice, it was reported that there was a possibility of the Slabs footpath being closed due to its surface being a danger to users. Alarm bells rang again, taking us back to 2002 when similar proposals to change the status of the footpath, removing the slabs and replacing with a three metre wide tarmac cycle track were being promoted by the County Council, but sensibly rejected at the time.

It seems that a 'fait accompli' has been presented to Quorn and Barrow Parish Councils but we confirm that despite the report stating that Quorn PC would not oppose a re-classification, this is untrue. Quorn PC (in whose parish the Slabs belong) has confirmed to the CC that the proposal is not something that it can support. All Quorn ever wanted was maintenance on a footpath which is considered to be of historic importance. It wishes to see it retained as a public right of way for walkers (see other article for Barrow PC's position).

Charnwood Campaign to Protect Rural England (CPRE), along with Leicestershire Ramblers Association, has recently carried out a peak time survey which shows that the percentage using the route is minimal. As land owners, Leicestershire CC allows the use of the footpath by cyclists quite legally by unspoken approval. This informal use is not opposed by CPRE and we appreciate that we need safe routes for cyclists. It is already deemed as a 'safe route to school'. However we oppose the change of use which would turn a pleasant rural footpath into an urbanised landscape with lighting across a small but treasured piece of countryside. Why routine maintenance cannot be carried out is difficult to understand. We are perhaps being cynical in considering that delaying this work over the years is a deliberate attempt to achieve a change of use by the authority.

However if necessary there is a possible alternative route which would take all non vehicular traffic off the Barrow-Quorn road as far as the roundabout adjacent to the A6 slip road to join an existing combined footway/cycleway. This has been promoted by CPRE and supported by the Leics Bridleways Association. It is to create a new route on County Council land parallel to the existing Barrow – Quorn road which would be sufficiently wide to take walkers, cyclists and horses. At present the road presents dangers to all these groups and the raised walkway is falling into disrepair. We have asked County Council officials for a feasibility study into this option but have so far been ignored.

Coincidentally in recent weeks, the CC has put in a new cycle track on Meynell Road, Quorn which stops short of the start of the Slabs by about 100 metres. Cyclist signs at the bottom of Barrow Road, Quorn point to Barrow along Meynell Road.

Any proposed changes to the Slabs will be opposed by CPRE and the Ramblers Association. 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
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
Gaynor Barton investigates improvements which should be in place at Barrow Station by the time you read this

Recently I've had to use Barrow Station as I couldn't drive owing to a broken wrist. It struck me quite forcibly how run-down the station had become from the clean, bright blue station I remembered using on a daily basis in 1996. I wondered what others thought so in early April I asked people sitting under the platform shelters for their opinions. Some were quite gentle,' Could be worse; it's only a little station' and 'lt's better than Sileby' but others were highly critical. 'The litter behind the shelter is disgraceful. I've watched the cleaners and they never pick all of it up or sweep the steps, and although they wipe off the graffiti they don't rub hard enough to remove it properly or the bird shit.' Others said 'It's not just the litter, it's the

condition of the steps that's dreadful. They are so dangerous because the ends are missing and you can easily slip when it's icy and wet. The only time anything will be done is when Network Rail is sued for £20,000 because someone has broken a leg'. But did Network Rail know about the steps and who was responsible for keeping the platforms clean? A little investigation was needed.

Well, it soon became very clear that Network Rail knew all about the dangerous steps. After they were first reported to the Parish Council by a Barrow resident in November 2006, there was initial confusion between the major protagonists; was it a Network Rail responsibility or should Central Trains carry the can? By January 07 it had been

firmly established that it was a Network Rail job and since then there have been many exchanges of e-mails and telephone conversations between Parish Councillors and others desperately trying to get Network Rail to start the 'nosings' work. Yes, the missing end-strips are called nosings - pronounced 'noseings'. Sadly they aren't an off-the shelf product so tricky to replace. However, at the time of going to press the work had been put out to tender and a company 'Construction Marine' awarded the contract. The work should have been completed by the middle of May 2007. It was impossible to get more detailed information than this out of Network Rail. The proverbial blood out of stones would have been far easier. (cont over)





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6 Ashby Square Loughborough Leicestershire LE11 5AA Central Trains had a completely different approach and one hot April afternoon Ivanhoe Line Route Manager Mr. Nigel Carlisle got off the 4pm train from Loughborough to see the problems for himself. He was shown the grunge behind the shelter and on the floor of the phone box, the dirty perspex windows, the overgrown bushes, the peeling paint on railings and lights and the dirty plastic poster covers. It was pointed out to him that information relating to whom to call in an emergency wasn't available and that one 'Barrow Upon Soar' platform sign had been stolen, with only the empty posts left standing. The Platform I tannoy had disappeared too causing great problems. If a (rare) announcement did come through concerning a cancellation it was only heard clearly on Platform 2, which still had its tannoy. Matters were made even worse if a train were passing on the fast line. Then it seems few people ever heard anything at all.

Mr. Carlisle listened sympathetically and left an hour later with a list of matters to look into back at his office. I'm delighted to be able to report that he has worked hard on Barrow Station's behalf and a recent e-mail has detailed the actions to be carried out.

- The cleaning team (two people) is scheduled to visit Barrow every Monday and once a month carry out a more thorough 'heavy clean' of all surfaces, platforms and steps.
- An arrangement has been made to clear the vegetation at the rear of Platform I to at least a metre and treat with weedkiller to prevent regrowth.
- Central Trains has measured and ordered new perspex panels to replace the damaged ones in all poster boards and waiting shelters.
- Two additional poster boards are to be sighted at the entrance to give the 'Useful Information' timetables and news of engineering works.
- A new set of posters has been ordered for display.
- Two replacement 'Barrow upon Soar' name boards have been ordered to replace the missing one and another that is damaged.
- Suppliers have been asked for a quote to replace the tannoy.



So fingers crossed, by the end of May the steps should be safe and the station a cleaner, more pleasant place to catch a train.

Adopt a Station

But problems will remain. As Mr. Carlisle pointed out, although he can make improvements, vandalism will still occur and he wondered what what Barrow people could do to help. One suggestion was the Station Adoption Scheme . 'Adopt a Station' groups make general aesthetic improvements such as helping with cleaning and removing graffiti, planting flower-beds - if room available on the platform, reporting vandalism and sometimes completing station surveys about maintenance. I have been assured they are easy to set up and extremely effective in keeping the station in the eye of both the village / town and train operator. Beaston is the station nearest to us which is already in the scheme. 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Hiding behind health & safety?

Although I do not live in Barrow now, I did for 20 odd years in the 60s - 80s and appreciated the safe lifeline the Slabs footpath was for Barrow children going to Rawlins and Quorn children coming to HP. At that time the Slabs were sometimes under water in the winter until the flood bank was built on the River Soar, but nobody complained about the "safety" aspect . I sometimes wonder about these "experts" who hide behind the H & S wall and resolve the problem in a negative way by closing down something on "safety" grounds. Surely a more positive way would be to look at what can be done to make the Slabs safe. I am sure this would be far less expensive than building a 3 metre wide, strip of tarmac which would then be used by cyclists and even motor cyclists. How safe would the slabs be then?

I cannot see what improvement will be achieved other than by repairing the Slabs and keeping it a safe traffic free route for pedestrians from both Barrow and Quorn.

So called 'improvements' to footpaths

I read with interest the proposed 'improvements' to the footpath between Barrow and Quorn. Known affectionately as the 'Slabs', it will shortly be renamed 'Macadam Way' following its widening, resurfacing and illuminating. Once this work has been carried out I wondered if the County Council would give consideration to the following upgrades of footpaths in the area:

(1) Barrow to Mountsorrel Footpath—
removal of pavings and replacing with an all
weather surface and strengthening of the 'one
man bridge' Coops, sorry, one person bridgeJ to
reduce the sway on the structure when young
people run across it.

(2) Levelling of Cliffe Hill Footpath Coops, sorry, Rookery Footpath) with the possible introduction of a lift on the steepest bit of the incline.

(3) Barrow to Walton Footpath — removal of all cow muck and loose mud, thus reducing the need for walkers to clean their boots or shoes after using this route.

(4) Barrow Bridge to Pines Lock Coops, sorry, Pillings Lock) — provision of raised timber walkway with handrail to river side of path as a health and safety measure.

From a Council of 13, five of the previous councillors did not stand for re-election: Brian Henman (after 31 years of service), Keith Perkins (12 years), Sue Higton, Simon Richards and George Robinson. They will all be sadly missed and we thank them for their enthusiasm, commitment and drive. As the responsibilities of the Council go on multiplying, a decision had already been taken to increase to 15 members. 
She welcomes the input from various groups resulting from the Parish Plan



He would like to see greater clarity and open-ness in the working of local government, including both the Parish Council and the Parish Meeting. He will continue to work for better conditions for cycling and walking in Barrow leading to less need for car transport

and a healthier society. He would like to see closer engagement of young people with the Parish Council giving them opportunities to participate in village government and therefore to aid in the shaping of tomorrow's village society.

He would like to resist further growth in size of Barrow but if growth is inevitable, then we should insist on improved facilities for health, recreation, young people and transportation.

He says 'Barrow is a very friendly village in which we should all involve ourselves to keep it so.'

You might be wondering what on earth is the Parish Meeting. I certainly was so I decided to go along to find out. This is an annual event and really it's the public version of the AGM for the Parish Council. This year it was held at the Methodist Church Hall on March 27th.

The most contentious issue this year, by far, was to do with 'The Slabs' footpath between Barrow and Quorn. This arose from comments in a recent Barrow Voice article where it appeared that this footpath might be covered with tarmac to become a cycleway as well as a

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
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
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Barrow Village Hall Action Group

Speedwatch Results Show We Need To Slow Down

As a result of proactive contact with Leicestershire County Council the Barrow Traffic Action Group was involved in the pilot of a county wide Community Speed Watch Campaign with the aim of encouraging drivers to slow down.

Groups of volunteers used speed cameras and noted details of vehicles travelling in excess of 35 mph. Speed was noted at various times of the day over a period of four weeks on Cotes Road, Strancliffe, Fishpool Way, Nottingham Road, Melton Road, Sileby Road and South Street.

Details were passed to Leicestershire County Council who passed them on to the police. Drivers were sent a letter asking them to keep their speed within legal limits, if the same vehicle was clocked more than once a further letter was sent by the police.

Details of 765 vehicles were passed to the co-ordinator; the average speed was 37.8 mph. There were 28 multiple offenders, one vehicle was clocked four times, 39/42/37/41 mph, and one was clocked three times, 36/37/39 mph. At the various sites 162 vehicles were travelling over 40 mph and three were travelling over 50 mph.

Cotes Road, Strancliffe had the highest number of vehicles travelling in excess of 35 mph – 219, with 43 over 40 mph and two over 50mph. Full details can be seen on the village website – www.barrowuponsoar.org.uk then go to Parish Plan & Action Groups.

The group is now working with the Parish Council to find ways to reduce speeding in the village. We are also looking at ways to achieve our other aims – improving traffic flow and easing congestion. 

Rehearsals are in Full Splurge

Rehearsals are in full splurge for the pie-flinging, pinstripewearing, pint-sized classic Bugsy Malone in this adaptation of the hit film that catapulted a young Jodie Foster to stardom!

Barrow Youth Theatre plays Prohibition-era mobsters in this tongue-incheek tribute to the 1920s gangster flick. It seems Fat Sam, who runs one of the most popular speakeasies in town, is in danger of being closed down by his "business rival" Dandy Dan. Enter baby-faced Bugsy Malone, a killer with the ladies and a definite asset to Fat Sam. Unfortunately, Bugsy has also caught the eye of Sam's girlfriend Tallulah (Jodie Foster in the film) - though he's set his designs on the showgirl Blousey Brown!

As in the film, the "non-violent" gang war is fought with "splurge guns" which spew forth splurge instead of bullets. It's a thoroughly charming, irreverent and clean (though very messy) showcase for a cast of talented young performers, with a book by Alan Parker, and a catchy, honky-tonk score by Paul Williams, one of the most popular songwriters of the '70's and '80's.

Barrow Youth Theatre re-tells the familiar story presenting it with all the energy and pazazz - including 'splurge' - that the youth theatre is known for, on 16th 17th November 2007.


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2007 Karate Tournament Winners

- BARROW-UPON-SOAR based Loughborough Shotokan

As the heading above points out, this was Loughborough Shotokan's year at the annual interclub event with their sister club Leicester Shotokan. This was the third tournament between the two clubs, but the first time the Barrow-Upon-Soar students had come out tops. With a massive collection of 28 trophies and medals, including both age categories for competitor of the day awards, which went to Stuart McHale (8), from Burton- On-The-Wolds and Lauren Baker (15), from Barrow-Upon-Soar. 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
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BARROW TOWN YOUTH FC

- Focus on the Under 14s

Barrow Town Youth Football Club has players from six to 19 years of age playing matches in the Leicester Leagues every Sunday from September until April, when the spring tournaments begin! Following last season's triumphs, this season has seen league titles for the under nines and under tens and the under 15s closing in on honours this season.

Meanwhile, the last Sunday in April saw the under 14s targeting the twin aims of a top four finish and raising money for a new kit (why do they all grow out of the old ones so quickly?!). The call came in at 10.00, half an hour before kick off -'We've raised 50p, so far!' The call was from the two Debbies who, like many mums before them, had offered to raise funds for their sons' football club and were running a car boot stall with stock donated by players' parents. Kit manufacturers have jumped on the bandwagon and the ranges on offer are vast and dazzling to the average 14 year old's eyes. Money to cover even a realistic shopping list was needed, so Debbie and the others sprang into action. The car boot improved its total to £120, sponsors donated £600 and the boys washed cars and raised £60. This targeted fund raising is a sign of the times: teams need home and away kits.. The boys have to join in to raise the money and they have responded well.

Meanwhile, on the pitch, the players were facing the league champions knowing they needed at least a point to finish in the top four. A very good result after last season's promotion. One nil down at half time, the team were playing well and just needed to keep going. They then went 2-0 down two minutes into the second half. They then showed true Barrow fighting spirit and continued to press for the elusive first goal. It eventually came with fifteen minutes to go. Wave after wave of Barrow attacks eventually saw the equalizer come. With the game finishing in a draw the under 14s moved into third place in the table and are now guaranteed that top four finish.

There are other costs incurred in running the club. The boundary wall that faces Bridge Street is constructed of stone and part of the village heritage. This requires maintenance which proves costly but the club feels the wall is preferable to a chain link fence. The club



house has recently been extended and refurbished but ongoing costs need to be met. Footballs need replacing and outside coaches and referees have to be paid. This expensive enterprise has income from a variety of sources, notably the annual Tournament that attracts teams from all over Leicestershire and from subscriptions from players mainly from Barrow but also from surrounding villages such as Burton on the Wolds, Hoton and Wymeswold. The club has also recently received a grant of £250 from BUSCA towards funding new strips.

The club's greatest asset however, is the time given freely by such people as Debbie & Debbie and by the managers and coaches who, on a regular basis, train the teams and arrange matches. The under 14s meanwhile, are planning their next car wash and looking forward to representing Barrow at tournaments in Barrow, Blackfordby and Quorn.

Negotiations are also underway to host a team from India, here in Barrow.
