



Extension to Holy Trinity Church for improved community facilities – *an update*

e are delighted that we now have a total of over £170,000 towards the extension. Our second grant application was successful and we are now forging ahead with further applications. Having now received the planning permission from Charnwood Borough Council, we aim to start the build in Spring 2010 and to do so aim to raise £100,000 from grant applications, leaving a balance of £30,000 to be raised within Barrow. We hope our CHALLENGE 09 will result in a variety of events, similar to last year's £10 give away, and look forward to announcing that total at our Christmas Tree Festival in December.

The Prestwold Ball in March added £3,700 to our funds and was a most enjoyable evening with excellent food and fine wine served followed by dancing to the Leicester Grammar School Dance Band and ending with John Bourne's disco. We are most grateful to the Packe-Drury-Lowe family for allowing us to use Prestwold Hall and to all who contributed to making the evening a success. Elizabeth Michael Photography kindly photographed guests arriving, donating the proceeds to the fund.

More recently a Fashion Show run by the Social Committee raised over £600 and was extremely well attended by members of the village. The May Day Bank Holiday Teddy Bear Bungee Jump and Fair brought lots of visitors and local families to the church. Two Teddy Bears suffered injuries but both were quickly treated on the spot and able to be reunited with their owners! The event raised £970 and we were most grateful to the Junior Church for their organisation.

Dates for your diary are the Safari Supper on Saturday 20th June and Friday, 3rd July when the pupils of Alison Print will once again be performing in the church. Alison is also hoping to come with her quartet, Élanaura Ensemble to perform at Holy Trinity Church on Thursday 30th July.

Barrow Library re-opens its doors

arrow-Upon-Soar Library on 16th February, following a major refurbishment

Bharti Acharya, Library Development Worker, said: 'We have had a total face lift creating more space plus a designated space for the computer users. New windows, carpets and lighting all assist in making a welcoming change for all, we hope. New books have also been added to our shelves, arranging the latter a little differently, but we hope that our regular customers will have no difficulty finding what they want'.

People -

In conversation with Jan Hind



or this issue I have been talking to Elsie Pagett. Elsie is Barrow, born and bred, and a great lover of this village of ours. When I approached her to share some recollections of her granddad, John (Jack) Illston with Barrow Voice readers, she kindly agreed and we got together for a jolly good chat. Elsie later supplied me with some very interesting written information too, some of which is included in this article.

Elsie's Grandad and Grandma Illston came to Barrow from Leicester in 1910. Jack had been running a business driving and supplying horse-drawn cabs and carriages – mainly used for funerals and weddings, but he was finding, more and more, that the new-fangled trams were taking business away from the cabbies. With a family to support, Jack had heard that the licence of the Three Crowns Public House at Barrow-upon-Soar had fallen vacant so, after due consideration, he applied for the licence. Jack brought his horses, his cabs and his carriages with him and was able to keep them in the stables at the back of the pub, where there was plenty of room.

Never one to miss an opportunity to help his friends and fellow Barrovians he soon identified a need for regular cost effective transport into Loughborough for the locals, especially on market days. With this in mind, he set up a Barrow to Loughborough horse drawn taxi service which was greeted with great enthusiasm.

Eventually, however, Jack and his wife decided to retire from the pub business. They moved in to live with their daughter and her family in a new house in Melton Road, and started a smallholding. Jack still had his horse drawn cabs which were popular for weddings and funerals in and around the village. There was never a shortage of children coming round to their house: the family also had an old bus in the back garden and the local children loved to come and play on it and there were always several horses and ponies around. The horses pulled the drays during the working day and then, when taken back to the fields, would be in great demand for giving rides to the children. The children also used to queue up to beg for rides in the carriages when they were on the return journey from a funeral.

Jack also owned and farmed a few fields in various parts of the village, mainly around the bottom of Mill Lane. At haymaking time Jack was there in the forefront. When the Mill Lane Fields were ready to be cut he would turn up with his refreshments – a bottle of cold tea and some sandwiches. He has been described as 'a man of strength, well over six feet in height' and I am sure he could have cut hay all day if he so decided, without exhausting himself.

Jack also served on the Co-operative Committee. He did this for several years as part of his commitment to the Village. Elsie says that, when it came to Committee Night at the Co-op, Jack used to say that he was off to grease the bacon! Elsie also recalls going to the Co-op in the dray and assumes that her grandfather was delivering goods from the station.

Jack was always willing to help people if he possibly could. One lady recollected that, when she had to move house, she was completely at her wits end as to how she could manage it. When Jack heard about this, he turned up and loaded all her furniture on to the dray and then drove it to the new house for her. Job done! Truly a good neighbour.

After his death various articles and tributes appeared in the local papers. This is one of them:

'Mr Tom Corbett, of Barrow-on-Soar, sends us the following appreciation of the late Mr John Illstone.

'Jack Illstone, as he was affectionately known, came with his parents to Barrow on Soar some 27 years ago as Mine Host of the Three Crowns Inn. He was a man of strength, well over six feet in height and his profession of cab and carriage driver had given him a sunburnt and weatherbeaten face. He had a fund of humour and a merry twinkle in his eyes, and the ready wit of the old London cabby.

Jack soon became a village institution; he was at the call of all and sundry to attend weddings, christenings, funerals and other events. He was tenant of the old Salter's, Playing Field, now the King George Playing fields, where many hardfought battles at one time took place between the Holy Trinity football team and their rivals, the Three Crowns, this being the headquarters, with Jack a member of the committee.

When anyone was in trouble, or needed a little help with horses or cattle, the expression 'Fetch Jack' was common, and sure enough Jack would leave his wife to carry on while he helped to smooth the path of the neighbour.

It became obvious to me, whilst talking to Elsie, how very much she had loved her Granddad and, also how very much he had been loved and respected by people in Barrow. Elsie's memories of him are still crystal clear and she knows that his example has given her a yardstick with which to measure her own life. For my part, it has been a pleasure and a privilege to learn, and to write about this energetic, hard-working man, who is still remembered by so many people in the village, and whose name, until now, I had only known from the street sign for Illston Gardens, just off Melton Road near the junction with Babington Road.

S am Butler, a past junior member of Barrow Panto Group, returns to review the latest production


There were enough custard pies and cross-dressing to rival any decent pantomime when Barrow Panto Group performed their annual show in March. The popular tale of Aladdin was given the Barrow treatment to a packed opening night audience at Humphrey Perkins Community Centre, complete with vigorous villains, a Geordie Genie and plenty of improvised banter from Gordon Kenneth's sparkling Widow Twankey.

I am the sentinel of Paudy Hill watching the shadows roll around me watching the village. Like Greenwich I make time palpable





You can also find information from the village website **www.barrowuponsoar.org.uk** and from the Heritage website

www.barrowuponsoarheritage.org.uk Some of the leaflets can be downloaded and printed.

Barrow has its own Parish Council Rights of Way walks publicised in its newsletter and on posters around the village. The LCC Barrow Parish walks leaflet outlines three routes ranging from 4³/₄ to 2³/₄ miles.

Also find the two Heritage Walks leaflets: Walking the Edge describes a $3^{1/2}$ mile circuit and a pick and mix of jitties. No 2 has three longer walks which explore the river (4+ miles), take you to Seagrave, Sileby and Mountsorrel (9 miles) and to Swithland reservoir (8 miles). Along with the route description, you also get some really interesting information about the heritage of the area: history, geology and natural history.

The Leicestershire and Rutland Wildlife Trust has produced a beautiful leaflet 'Rewilding the Soar Valley ' that guides



you to seven sites along the River Soar (sadly not including Barrow) where a project is underway to restore wildlife and wild places.

Walking within the village can be given a purpose by following the Fossil Trail. This is a circular route that finds the 10 groups of fossil sculptures that were created over 10 years ago by students of Loughborough College of Art. There are two leaflets: one for adults that contains a map locating the fossils and an activitybased one for children.

If your interest in history is a bit more recent, the booklet 'Places of Historic

Interest' locates 24 sites with information about each. You can enrich this still further by buying the booklet 'People and Places' that provides delightful pen and ink drawings and poems about the places and people of Barrow's past. The booklet costs only £2.00 from the Paper Shop. All the other publications mentioned above are free.

You can make a very short walk around the Millennium Park. Before you go, pick up an interesting leaflet that describes the creation and workings of Barrow's unique Millennium sundial.

Old St. Alban's on the Fossil Trail

f you try out Barrow's Fossil Trail this summer, your leaflet will tell you to turn down the Hollybush jitty. At the bottom you will find a representation of a trapped Jurassic dragonfly in a beautifully shaped lump of orange 'amber' protruding from a bracket on the wall of an old building.

This is now in private hands but used to be St. Alban's, Barrow's Roman Catholic Church and was built in 1839 by Irish Navvies working on the railway. As there is little space in the leaflet for other than the bare bones I thought it would be interesting to find out what had happened. Why did this tucked away church with its ' attached dwelling ' become de-consecrated and given a new lease of life as two residential houses? And what was the area like when it was first built?

The second question is the easier to answer. Although the building is surrounded on all sides by houses now, when it was spanking new it was sited amongst fields and orchards and slightly away from the heart of the village. This was probably deliberate as it was only ten years since the 1829 Catholic Emancipation Act had been passed and in those distant days many still thought of Roman Catholics as different from Protestant folk; they were even regarded with a little suspicion. The area remained rural until the 1950's when more houses were built along Church Street.

The church finally closed its doors in 1989. Many people, especially those who had regularly worshipped there were very saddened by the closure but it wasn't just the Catholic community that missed the church; others of different faiths in the village regretted the loss as it had become part of Barrow. Over the years the worshippers had made many repairs themselves, and collected money to keep things going, but by this time there were major problems they couldn't rectify. The walls were bowing outwards, the heavy Swithland roof slates and ground liable to subsidence from old nearby lime workings were said to be the culprits. The interior



walls had been cracked for years. But perhaps most tellingly of all is that a priest, Father Cunningham, wanted to restart ringing the bell before Sunday Mass. Sadly he had to be tactfully dissuaded. The bell had long been silent as the regular worshippers feared that if it were enthusiastically rung the fragile enclosing brickwork might fall down and cause even the wall to collapse!

So the church was de-consecrated and sold. This resulted in the Catholic community becoming a less obvious presence in the village as people now worshipped at St Gregory's in Sileby, in the Bishop Beveridge Club or each others homes. Yet there were advantages to worshipping in Sileby particularly in relation to music. In the old days St Alban's had a good choir but only an old hand pumped organ whereas St. Gregory's now has the benefit of electricity and a regular organist. There is therefore greater scope for the singing of sacred music.

In the 1990's the church and 'attached dwelling' were gutted. This 'attached dwelling' now called 'The Priest House ' had often been used as such in the 19th century. However, in the mid twentieth it had become the church caretaker's home. Mr and Mrs. Hubbard were the last to occupy the house in its original

And what's it like to live there now? Well, I asked Jane Melbourne, the present owner of The Priest House and she loves it. Jane and her family moved in over a year ago. She particularly likes its quirkiness the little passageways, the different heights of its doors, the low windows, the way the rooms exude a feeling of warmth and cosyness and the ease of access to the flower beds and rambling clematis of the cottage garden. Since moving in she has noticed several little groups of Fossil Trail folk walking along the jitty. This summer make sure you are one of them too.

The third change on Barrow High Street affects the chemists: Alliance Pharmacy merged with Boots three years ago and gradually, all their shops have been transformed into **Boots Local**. The transformation in Barrow started in April and ended with a Grand Opening on May 5th by Lilian Middleton, who was Barrow's independent pharmacist for many years.

There have been no changes of staff or opening times (still Mon – Fri 8.30 – 6.00, Sat 9 – 5, with lunchtime closing 1 - 2). All the services that had been developed by Alliance remain with an improved prescription dispensary, private consultations, medicine usage reviews, prescription collection service and Quit Smoking advice. What is new is the facility to use the Boots Advantage Card (described as the most generous loyalty card in the UK). phone.





So following an invitation from the new manager Paul Hubbard, it was with great promise that my family and I set off there for Sunday lunch.

With The Pullman being set in an old railway station and its location just off of the A46 to Newark, outside the village by about a mile, it is one of those quirky places that really sticks in your memory and driving up to the pub all of those distant memories came flooding back. On entering The Pullman, formerly known as 'The Schooner', we were not only welcomed by an appetising carvery counter, but a reassuring blend of 'Orient Express' luxury and nostalgia from a bygone era.

The Pullman prides itself on fresh, traditional home-cooked food, sourced from local suppliers and we were not to be disappointed - my father-in-law even stated that it was the best carvery he had ever experienced... and if you knew the man, that kind of comment does not come easily. The kids were spoilt for choice with the selection of perfectly prepared vegetables on offer and it was refreshing to find an eatery that was happy for our two little ones to share a child portion. And the deserts... wow, truly splendid... what an ice-cream sundae - you have got to try one to believe it!

In short, faultless.

They serve their famous carvery all day on Sunday, and a sensational Summer menu salad carte in the week. In addition to their evening 'a la carte' menu they also offer other 'special' dishes.

id you know Barrow Pre- School Playgroup was established in 1971? The group is now Ofsted registered and runs for three hours every term time weekday morning from 9.15am to 12.15pm for children aged 2 to 5 in the Methodist Church Rooms. Playgroup has always been popular with the very young members of our community as well as neighbouring villages. In fact, many parents who attended themselves as children in the early days are now bringing their own children. There are also a lot of new faces which is great. Barrow is growing and has a lot to offer.
