Holy Trinity Church -The Open Church Challenge

he Soar Valley is noted for its fine collection of medieval churches and Barrow Parish Church is no exception. Few country parishes have a church of such beauty and dimensions. The church was originally built over 800 years ago and was substantially rebuilt between 1862 and 1870, not least because of a collapse of the tower and a large part of the nave on 18th December 1868.

Today the church building offers immense historic interest, incredible artwork expressed in stained glass windows, the carved reredos, the wood furnishings and the general architecture, support to a worshipping community and a place of quiet and stillness, giving space for our engagement with ourselves, our creation and God.

Over the last five years, members and supporters of Holy Trinity Church have been working towards an extension to be built onto the north side of the church. Our vision is for this to open up greater use of the church and to offer the village a modern, accessible, community space.

Recently, the church council spent an evening exploring our hopes and vision for the future of the church and the extension. One of the themes which emerged in the discussions is the inspiration behind this article and can be called, *'The Open Church Challenge.'*

The Open Church Challenge is a vision for the members and supporters of Holy Trinity Church, including those who have a pattern of attending services and those who don't, to serve on a rota in order allow the church to be open each week day for visitors from 10 am to 12 md. This would greatly extend the current times when the church is open for visitors, outside service times, which is all day on Saturday. There would always be two 'hosts' and their role would be to provide a presence and welcome. We want to do this in order to offer a different kind of space, in contrast to the busy intensity of life around us, for refreshment and reflection. We want to open up the church to more people more of the time.

Before the initiative began we would have briefing sessions on procedures and the church history for all the volunteers. Whilst we will be working towards starting this new initiative next Spring, we do need a good response to this article to give us the confidence to keep developing this possibility - a gift we want to open up to the village and beyond.

Great fun, great fellowship, great cakes! Holiday at Home 2010

Il you have to be is over 60. You don't have to be a Baptist, Methodist, RC or C of E or anything at all - all you have to be is over 60. There's no maximum age limit; a good number are in their 70's and 80's with a few hardy types enjoying the week in their 90's. All are welcome. Although Barrow Baptists run the Holiday at Home Week, the organisers emphasise that anyone can come and this all inclusive nature of the scheme is really appreciated by the people who attend. "It couldn't have happened 20 years ago" I was told, "but people have realised that getting on together is what matters not which church you go to. We all mix together - the fellowship is marvellous."

This year the scheme attracted about 80 people, mostly from Barrow but several from Sileby and Loughborough. Even Barrow born and bred stumble across long term Barrow residents they've never met before. How delightful and what a surprise! Getting people to mingle and extend your circle of friends is all part of the experience. A lady who's attended in past years said, "The organisers mix us up as we have to go to different rooms for different activities and we change tables at lunch time too so

we sit next to different people. We chat and laugh a lot. It's all very friendly - enjoyable from start to finish. I'm over the moon during Holiday at Home week." To cover the costs of lunches, teas and talks small donations are requested but never insisted upon. In fact it's Barrow's senior holidaymakers that insist on paying their way; they don't want charity.

This scheme for seniors has been going since 2004 having developed from the church's monthly luncheon club. Now the

experienced organisers make sure the week not only gets off to a cracking start but continues to provide four stimulating afternoon activities linked by a common theme. This summer's theme was Water for Life. As an experienced Holiday at Homer said, "You do things you never thought you would. It gets you out of the house and you use your imagination instead of just watching television. It's the craft work I love. It keeps your brain going even though your body's gone!"

There's always a craft afternoon spent making or doing something following a talk or demonstration on the subject. This year's craft was Canal Boat Art following a talk about life on a working canal boat and crafty activities during Friday's Day at the Seaside. Most of the activities take place in the social room behind the Baptist Church in Beveridge Street but there's always one full day's outing. This trip is very much looked forward to especially by people who can't get about easily because they are using wheelchairs. Holiday at Home has many hands to help them get into private cars or onto a special coach with a lift. Leamington Spa was this year's destination.

There are light-hearted quizzes and games scattered through the week; rumour has it that this year tails were pinned to donkeys after a fish and chip lunch when the seaside came to Beveridge Sreet!
Certainly there were ice cream cornets, hook-a-duck, skittles and a chance to paddle! Music ended this July's programme with the Loughborough Concert Band playing in Holy Trinity Church on Sunday August 1st. This was followed by a short service of Praise where, as usual, favourite well known hymns were sung with great gusto. For the Holiday at Home' folk Sunday is not their day of rest, it's Thursday.

Nothing happens on Thursdays as holiday makers may like a rest after the Wednesday outing and get themselves organised for the final three days.

An unusual extra for this summer's Holiday was the presence of an Aquabox (get the water theme?). It's a collection of useful items that a family might need for their survival after a catastrophe such as a

hurricane, a flood, a tornado or an earthquake. The Homers were invited to contribute small items to build up a complete aquabox which will be distributed to a needy family somewhere in the world by the organising charity.

Village toilets may close

couple of years ago we voiced concerns about the early closing of Barrow's public toilets in the car park on North Street. Shoppers and visitors had noticed that the facilities were no longer open after 4pm. The timing was due to the cleaning schedule operated by Charnwood Borough Council and health and safety fears for the cleaners working after dark.

Now Charnwood has announced that it will be closing all rural public conveniences on 31 March 2011. By the time you read this, the short consultation period to gather views on the closure by the Parish Council will have closed.

The Parish Council is discussing 'what happens next' and we will be following this story in future issues.



Speeding traffic on Fishpool Way

reader on Nursery Close has raised the issue of traffic exceeding the 30mph limit on Fishpool Way, an area with quite a lot of pedestrian activity as people use the Millennium Park regularly.

He would like to see 30mph signs on the lamp posts as a reminder to drivers to keep their speed down. He has lobbied various local councils without success.

While acknowledging that, with street lighting already there, this is not a legal requirement, he feels that if something is not done, then there will be a serious accident.

Harold Mitchell 1916 - 2010

arold was born in New Street in 1916 and stayed in the village for the rest of his life, dedicating a large part of it to helping others. He started his education in the primary school on Cotes Road and as the system was then, moved onto the big school in Church Street. When he had finished his schooling at the age of 14, he had several jobs: he was a joiner with Mr Hind of Briggs Hill, Barrow, delivery boy for Bonsor's Bakery in Quorn, a joiner for Clemersons of Loughborough and finally a knitter at Drivers Hosiery in the village. He stayed at Drivers for over 49 years with a six year break when he was serving with the REME during the Second World War. Harold fought all through the European campaign but like most men of his time was very modest, and didn't talk about his experiences. One can only imagine the memories he carried with him.

Harold met Lucie, a young lady from Belton near Hepworth in Lincolnshire and made her his wife in 1945. They were married for an incredible 63 years, having three children, two girls Ann and Elaine and a son Les. Elaine has fond memories of travelling in a little green van with Harold when he delivered the Sunday papers for Clarks and later on for Webster & Barnes, covering the villages of Burton and Wymeswold and also to some of the yards in Barrow that are now long gone.

After Harold retired there was to be no sitting around for him; he became a lollipop man on Mill Lane / South Street, seeing the children over the road safely for 14 years in all weathers and never missing a day.

Harold had a passionate interest in the village and its residents. He was a valued Parish Councillor for 15 years and would help anyone out with a problem. If he didn't know the answer himself then he would leave no stone unturned until the problem had been solved. Being a Parish Councillor was only one string to Harold's bow.

He was a trustee of the almshouses, secretary of the Mountsorrel branch of the Ancient Order of the Foresters, a volunteer with Citizens Advice Bureau in Loughborough, a member of the committee of the WEA and also of the Local Studies group and an avid reader.

He was greatly interested in the history of the village and surrounding area. He was also a member of the Bishop Beveridge club, a lifelong member of the Methodist church, but also a friend of the other churches in Barrow. Many people will remember Harold carrying the British Legion Flag on Remembrance Sunday and in later years laying a wreath for fallen comrades.

Unfortunately Harold had a severe stroke that was very debilitating but his awareness

and interest in the village never diminished and right to the end he would acknowledge people with a smile. In his daughter's words people knew Harold as a kind, thoughtful, charming, cheery and helpful man, who had time for everyone. He was a fount of knowledge on local history with a wonderful memory and interested in the world in general .

The village has lost a true character.

During his career Peter has been much involved in strategies to raise the attainment of pupils in a truly meaningful and relevant way. He believes there is no ceiling to achievement and at HPHS he aims to establish a culture that recognises and strives for excellence at every level within the school. He says "Everyone is an individual with potential, and I will endeavour to realise that potential.



Humphrey Perkins is already a success; I look forward to leading the school to even greater heights for the benefit of the children and staff in our care."

Peter is no stranger to the community dimension of schools. He sees Humphrey Perkins not only as serving the local community but also a place where the village feels welcome and a part.


Barrow Voice wishes Peter well and we hope that he will quickly feel welcome in the community.



60 seconds with...

Frances Thompson



How long have you been involved with Barrow Voice and what do you like best about the magazine?

A profile of John Whitworth

n Barrow we seem to be extremely lucky to have a wealth of talented people. Through the pages of Barrow Voice it is possible to show off one of them and learn more about him.

John Whitworth, Pat his wife and their three girls moved from Quorn to Melton Road, Barrow in 1986.

They have always been involved in art and music and from our own experience, as their immediate neighbours, there was nothing better than hearing summer evening rehearsals of The Vautor Ensemble held in their garden. The wonderful sounds of unaccompanied early choral music could be heard wafting over the garden wall under the watchful baton of John, often I might add, accompanied by hoots of raucous laughter as a joke was shared!

John was born at Ely, Cambridgeshire on the 27th December 1921. He recalls a very happy childhood, the youngest of four children, having an older brother and two sisters. His father had a good bass voice and his sister Angela was musical and a talented pianist. John remembers his first musical experience, at the age of four, sitting on his brother's knee and playing the piano with him.

He was educated at Kimbolton School, Huntingdonshire, which he hated! John recalls hating the food, being away from home and the Headmaster! However he had no trouble studying or with other members of staff.

In the 6th form he was the only pupil to study the Arts and English, French, Music etc. He also enjoyed sport, especially cricket and even football, then! Cricket continues to be one of his passions.

When war broke out in 1939, John was 18 years old and his schooling was interrupted as he volunteered for service in the RAF. His desire to be a pilot was thwarted by his failure to pass the eye test so he trained as a Flight Mechanic and served as a Flight Lieutenant. He was transferred to Canada in 1941, travelling on the Queen Elizabeth. Here he worked on Harvard trainer aircraft. While in Canada, John was fortunate enough to sing in the RAF male voice choir and also in the Cathedral in Kingston

Ontario, where he regularly practised on the Cathedral organ.

From 1946 to 1949 he was an undergraduate at Kings College Cambridge, having won a scholarship as a Choral Scholar. As a male alto he sang in all the services. On his graduation in 1949 he was appointed as Alto Lay Vicar at Westminster Abbey, a position he held for 22 years. During this time at the Abbey, John developed his career as a soloist and performer. This included singing in specialist small groups such as The Deller Consort, The Golden Age Singers and the Well Tempered Singers, which was a very successful male voice quartet, giving nearly 80 public concerts. John also sang in other specialist choirs such as Schola Polyphonica, and the Renaissance Singers, which he directed for seven years.

He sang as a soloist both in England and abroad, including performing at the Three Choirs Festival and the Festival of Britain, to name two of many. Other solo performances have been at the Albert Hall in the Proms, the Festival Hall, Brompton Oratory, St Paul's Cathedral and of course Westminster Abbey.


He gave over 100 broadcasts for the BBC until his retirement, as well as making many recordings.

During this time he also taught at the Guildhall giving singing lessons to aspiring counter tenors.

John was commissioned to write musical arrangements for groups such as the world renowned Kings Singers.

He was organist from 1965 to 1970 at St Paul's Covent Garden, the Actors' Church as it is known.

In 1963, when they both sang in a Bayswater church choir, he met and married Pat and the next year they had their first daughter Alexandra. Juliet was born the year after, followed by Victoria in 1969. John and the family moved to



Leicestershire in 1971 on his appointment as Assistant Music Adviser to the Local Education Authority. Outside education, John was organist and choirmaster at Holy Cross Priory in Leicester until he retired at the age of 80.

John's passion for aircraft is only exceeded by that for his cars. During his life John, has owned over 35 cars including three vintage Rolls Royces (they were cheaper in those days), two Daimlers, two Jaguars, and a Morris Oxford called Emma.

Many people will know John through the family dogs, William and Freddy, and previously Henry, who he regularly walked around the local fields. Some will recognise him as the father of Vicki of Wash and Wags fame. Few will be aware of his remarkable history and his contribution to the world.

John has just completed a book about his life entitled 'Musical Notes'. It will be available to buy at a cost of £20.

Barrow Going Green?

On Wednesday 29th September, Barrow Parish Council is inviting anyone who is interested in Green Issues to come along to a meeting in the PC Office on High Street to promote Green projects in Barrow.

ersonally, I am a passionate
Greenie and I've been doing a bit
of sleuthing to see what other
people in Barrow are feeling and doing
about Green issues. I was going to stand
outside Somerfield and stop passers by
but then I remembered how much I
hate other people doing that to me. So
I've been a bit more discreet. Perhaps
you didn't realise!

Over a year ago, Charnwood BC involved Barrow in a pilot on ways to improve recycling and reduce what is put out for landfill. They chose Barrow for the Switch pilot because there had been a very positive interest shown by our residents. The outcome, many months later was a dramatic increase in the use of recycling boxes and bags, a reduction of landfill waste (black wheelie bins), a big take-up of brown wheelie bins for council composting and a lot of people starting to do their own composting with wormeries, cones and the like.

Also over the past 18 months, the demand for allotments has soared. More and more people want to grow their own although, sadly, the supply of land for allotments is not meeting demand. The Parish Council is pressing for more land to be made available.

I have spoken to several Barrow families who have decided to shop in the village rather than in Tesco or where ever, and to buy little and often to save wasting unwanted food. One lady waxed lyrical about the money she was saving, partly because she was buying less, partly because she had started to cycle to the shops. I'm hoping she'll turn up at the meeting on the 29th and enthuse others.

We are starting to see solar panels sprout on Barrow roofs. At the moment, the most common is the solar water heater: it's plumbed into your central heating and supplies hot water to the taps. Even on cloudy days in winter it can warm up the water enough to give you a decent shower



or a sink wash.

One Barrow family has had a panel for four years and they are able to turn off the central heating from March to October and still have hot water in the taps (but not the radiators, of course).

I have just installed the other kind of panel: the photo-voltaic panels which generate electricity. I have enough southfacing roof to put up 16 panels which can generate nearly 4kW when it is clear bright sun at midday. I benefit from the new 'feed in tariff' whereby my electricity provider pays me 41p for every kW hour I generate regardless of how much I use. On top of that, I get a lower electricity bill because I generate some of what I use and I also get 3p per kWh for half of what I generate because it is deemed to feed into the electricity network (ie I don't use it). I am expecting to have covered the cost of the panels within the next 10 years. If anyone wants to know more about my experience with photo-voltaic panels, I would be more than happy to natter.

However, perhaps the most impressive example of green behaviour of all sorts must be found at Humphrey Perkins. The school has teamed up with Manor Farm in Long Whatton to supply their organic meat and home-baked bread for the school restaurant and to run educational trips for pupils to help them understand where our food comes from. They will find out about green farming methods, responsible farming and a lot more. Then there's the new school vegetable garden; it's a sight to behold and is already supplying the restaurant with fresh salad and herbs. Read Dominic Boston's account of how it came to be created following this article

So people in Barrow are taking the lead in trying to live environmentally responsible lives. What we need now is more people doing more of these things. So do please come along to the meeting on September 29th. Details can be found on the Barrow Focus page. As a community, we could be helping promote green awareness and in the future, who knows, we could be generating community hydroelectric power by harnessing the River Soar in Barrow. And building a community wind turbine or setting up a community composting scheme. The possibilities are tremendously exciting but they need committed people to drive the ideas forward.

The Vegetable Garden

How it started...

group of our Year 8 students have been involved in the Npower Climate Cops competition. They want to encourage people to grow their own vegetables in an effort to reduce air miles and encourage healthy eating. To do this they made a vegetable garden at school and use the produce in the school restaurant. This also ties in with our vision to transform food culture as a Food for Life Flagship School.

Donations

In January and February, the team contacted local businesses to ask for materials and support in building the raised beds and were very successful. Andy Barker at Hathern Nurseries donated compost, seeds and young plants, Vital Earth donated compost and Travis Perkins had also kindly donated £150 of wood towards the project. We also received lots of advice and help from Groundwork Leicester and Garden Organic.

Making the raised beads

On the 24 Feb, with advice from the Soil Association, the pupils planned where the

beds should be positioned, how many they could accommodate and how to build the beds. The day started at 12.20pm with a safety briefing and then all the pupils and volunteers from staff, governors, parents and the local community enjoyed a nutritious gardener's lunch before starting work.

The group were visited by the Mayor and Mayoress of Charnwood who wished everyone well with their venture and then started proceedings by digging up the first clod of earth. The team worked hard from 1pm to 4pm and achieved a great deal. They built several raised beds, laying down ground cover over the path areas which

will later be covered by bark chips and preparing space for the compost bins.

At the end of the day they were tired, dirty but delighted to have achieved so much.

this March. You can now sit and enjoy the colourful raised beds.








Humphrey Perkins School Vegetable Garden

Karate Six Years on

Tell who would have thought it? It seems no time at all that I was one of the first adults at a then new karate club in the scout hut that had just become alive and, well, kicking. It was all a bit strange really and I even wrote a piece about it for Barrow Voice ('A morning with Mr Punch', from memory). There was Mr Punch, whose name was Pete, getting us to do a range of odd Japanese exercises in a space that he explained was called a 'dojo', a word that is unlikely to be Japanese for scout hut. And six years on, a Joseph's coat of coloured belts have come and gone and to my surprise I find myself with a newly-acquired black one.

Quite a day all round actually, I reflected as I collapsed in the bath after the grading exam, if that's not an unattractive mental image. A gingerbread man clothed in white icing with a black liquorice belt had been presented to me on my return home and get this - my teenage daughter (also a club member and, irritatingly, better at it than I am) said that she was proud of me.



But the really astonishing thing - the punch line, if you'll forgive the phrase - is that I am the living proof that pretty much anyone can do this, for sporting talent have I none. Indeed, throughout my school days, mediocrity did not so much describe my prowess as represent a distant goal of which I could only dream. A third place in the school sports day obstacle course aged 11 was as good as it got in primary school and I once made a third choice rugby team in secondary that got thumped by a bunch of Neanderthal men from Birkenhead. So no great sporting talent required: just being able to find the time to train once or twice a week and I now find myself lining up with the other black belts - if not the best, fastest, or strongest, then at least the baldest. And anyway, those of us longer in the tooth than we might wish, need our

exercise like everyone else and karate is good exercise. Not just because you get out of breath, although you do, but because it works equally the upper and lower body, left and right sides, so limiting the likelihood of repetitive strain injuries. And as with any course of good exercise, you do start to look better, which is good for your own ego as well as - how can one put it - being appreciated by your significant other, which is as far as one would want to go in a magazine with a family readership.

You'll note by the way, that I haven't mentioned fighting. I don't like it much and strictly speaking, karate isn't really about fighting anyway. It's all got rather more to do with courtesy, self-awareness and confidence, all of which are far more likely to keep you out of a fight than knowing

what to do if you were ever attacked (although there's no getting away from it, you do learn how to do this). Nor for that matter is karate about destroying pieces of wood with your bare hands. So if this is something you have a pressing need to achieve, then a small saw purchased from B&Q will accomplish the task rather better than taking a course of karate instruction. I did, however, once witness a very experienced black belt dispatch a wasp into the great scout hut in the sky with a single strike from the edge of his hand and in so doing, cut it neatly in two.

For all the wonky eyes, the gingerbread man was probably in better shape than I was by the time I'd finished the grading exam.
