

# Up-date on the Extension to Holy Trinity Church

The at Holy Trinity are excited that the building of the extension, which seems to have been in the planning stage for so long, will shortly commence and will provide much improved community facilities at the church, allowing the church building itself to be opened up for wider use by the community.

We have now appointed SP and AJ Building and Development Ltd of Mountsorrel as our main contractor and once the work starts, completion is due within 30 weeks.

We are planning to have a meeting in church on 1st March at which our contractor will answer any questions that local residents might have.

We look forward to having our new building available in the autumn. At the time of writing this article we are still making a few amendments to internal fittings and finishes in order to reduce the price to within our budget although we look likely to have a further £60,000 to raise. Our aim is to complete the fundraising for the build by the end of 2011. The sale of the church rooms is progressing and we plan to keep all our current users informed on its progress.

We are presently making further grant applications and planning more fundraising events. Our next event is the Fun Dog Show which we held for the first time last year on the May Day Bank Holiday and following its success, we

look forward to repeating this event on Monday afternoon, 2 May so all of you who have dogs, please come along and support us!

# Barrow fighter pilot's medals fetch £241,500

Johnny Johnson, one of the best RAF fighter pilots in the Second World War, died aged 85 last year leaving instructions that his medals should be sold at auction.

his took place last December at Spink's, a specialist coin and medals dealer in London. They obtained such a high price because, as a Spink's spokesman said, "This is a unique collection reflecting sustained gallantry over a lengthy period of time". During the war Johnny Johnson took part in nearly 700 combat missions. The collection at auction was made up of 19 medals, five original flying log books and five photograph albums. They were all to remain in the UK.

As many Barrow Voice readers will already know Johnny Johnson was born at 21 Warner Street in 1915, the son of the village police sergeant and his Shepshedborn wife Beatrice.

When Johnny was seven, his family moved to Melton Mowbray as his father had been promoted to the rank of inspector. As an RAF Spitfire fighter pilot Johnny shot down a record 38 enemy planes, but he learnt to shoot as a teenager killing rabbits and pigeons, then selling

them on Melton market. As a young fighter pilot in 1941 he flew with the famous wartime hero Douglas Bader and they became close friends.

The connection between Air Vice Marshall Johnny Johnson and Barrow upon Soar is celebrated in two ways; there is a small plaque to his memory at the War Memorial and Johnson Close is named in his honour.

# Passionate about Barrow

re you passionate about Barrow? Want to make a difference? Got a little time available? Well, why don't you stand for election to the Parish Council on May 5th?

At my very first Barrow Voice planning meeting I found myself volunteering for my first project... "A day in the life of a Barrow Parish Councillor". I would like to

think of myself as a young passionate resident of our village, but I soon realised that I had no idea what these councillors do.

Naturally I turned to the internet; I learned when the next meeting was, who our clerk is and when the offices on the High Street are open. Next port of call was my family and friends; I was met with blank faces! I decided I needed to meet with Tony Childs, our Parish Council chairman.

Tony worked for many years as a senior teacher

in Loughborough and supported his wife Ann with her involvement in many community activities. When he retired, Tony was encouraged to apply to be coopted into the parish council after the May 2007 elections and in 2010 he was elected as the Parish Council chairman. His particular interests have long been the care of the elderly, the environment and health facilities in Barrow. As a Parish Councillor, Tony has been instrumental in the set up of the annual Parish Council Health Debate and in the preparation of

the "Who Cares, We Care" booklet, both of which are successful and welcome additions to the welfare of our parish community. As our chairman, he seeks to ensure that all councillors have a fair hearing at the meetings of full council, which are held once a month on a Tuesday evening. He works closely with the parish clerk, Lesley Bell, who ensures that the Parish Council functions within the law and serves the village to the best

of its ability.

village functioning while being a vibrant and enjoyable place to live in. Effectively they are your voice and work together to achieve change and make a real difference to Barrow. The four year term as a Parish Councillor involves attending to the Parish Council meetings once a month and being a member of at least one sub committee. Councillors are also encouraged to form working parties to deal with projects that have a narrow focus for the community such as the Switching on of the Christmas lights or

the Village Bike ride. Full training is given to newly elected

> Councillors along with support and advice from seasoned Councillors!

As village residents we pay towards the Parish Council's precept through our council tax. The precept funds the operations of the Parish Council. For example, it has enabled the Parish Council to adopt the public toilets next to The Three Crowns following the withdrawal of funding by Charnwood Borough Council. Did you also know that the Detached Youth Workers are likely to be decommissioned and the Parish Council is seeking ways

to continue their work in the community?

Recently the Council has held public consultations related to the Jelson Melton Road application in order to gauge the views of the village as a whole. These are examples of the diverse nature of care that the Council has to consider on behalf of Barrow.

> The only pre-requisite to becoming a Parish Councillor is that you have been living or working within a three-mile radius of Barrow for the past 12 months. You also need to be energetic, innovative and committed to Barrow and its residents and happy to dedicate three to four hours a week to this vital role.

Our Parish Councillors are passionate about the fabric and nature of the community. They bring with them the enthusiasm and know-how to keep our

The two playing fields, the cemetery on Cotes Road, the Roundhouse, the War Memorial and Millennium Park are all owned by the Parish Council. The 15 members of the Parish Council are responsible for the maintenance of these familiar parts of Barrow.

In addition to a Councillor inspecting the sites regularly, sub committees meet bi-monthly to ensure that these assets are cared for so that people can enjoy and use them safely.

The Parish Council also works towards improving services that are carried out by other councils. For example, Leicestershire County Council is supposed to maintain footpaths and bridleways but if a resident reports a problem such as a broken stile, the Parish Council will do its best to get the LCC to deal with it; similarly with street lighting, street cleaning and full or damaged litter bins. When Barrow's pavements were caked with uncleared snow in December, the Parish Council had to be really persuasive to get the County Council to do some High St clearing (and even then, they only did one side - the sunny side which would have melted first anyway!)

All in all, after meeting with Tony and reading the readily available booklet Want to be a local Councillor I am not only very proud of our councillors but feel more informed about how the development and infrastructure of our beautiful village is managed and maintained.

I do hope the first three questions in the article will now be answered: Yes, Yes and When is the next election? (5th May 2011). And if you can't go that far, at least you will use your vote.

# JELSON'S PLANNING APPLICATION FOR 300 HOMES

t the time of writing this update, early March, 2011, the planning application made by Jelson for a development of around 300 homes off Melton Road has not been reconsidered by Charnwood Borough Council planning committee. It is now a year since the original application was rejected on nine points of refusal, mostly and significantly on the effect the plan would have on the local highways. Jelson resubmitted their plan last Summer (2010) and we continue to wait for a decision.

In the meantime both BRAG and Barrow Parish Council have remained completely opposed to this development and believe that the vast majority, if not all, of residents of the village are of the same view. If any resident of the village has the view that this development should receive planning permission then they should write to Barrow Voice or Barrow Parish Council or BRAG who would be interested to hear reasons in favour.

During February 2011, members of BRAG, and Barrow Parish Council were involved in a traffic survey, under the auspices of the Parish Council. This was overseen by a traffic consultant employed by Barrow Parish Council. This has now given the Parish Council access to traffic information to compare to that submitted by the developer. The consultant has also undertaken other relevant work for the Parish Council. We understand that the safety of the junction of Grove Lane with Sileby Road and South Street is a particular concern to the Highways Authority because this junction would see an increased use if the development goes ahead. Making a right turn on to South Street is particularly unsafe now.

During the winter perhaps the most significant contribution from BRAG was exposing the use of incorrect information on planning targets. Charnwood Borough Council ( and other councils) are required to demonstrate a five year supply of land for housing and the developers plan quoted a supply of less than three years and used this to reinforce their case on the basis that they were helping the council achieve their target. In fact, there are two targets in Charnwood Borough, one for urban areas, which is the outskirts of Leicester and one for villages, known as non primary urban areas (non-PUA). Whilst the urban areas were significantly short of their target, the non-urban areas, the villages, including Barrow were almost at target with a five year supply in place of 4.96 years last November. The values were averaged to give an impression of need when in fact there was none in the villages. We exposed this in letters to the Loughborough Echo and a senior Borough councillor has acknowledged we are correct on this. We will continue to monitor these land supply targets and complain if they are misused.

Many village residents have written to the Borough council to oppose this development after Barrow Parish Council's selective leaflet distribution to resident's homes on a route , identified by the developer, as a safe walking route to the village centre. This included Babington Road, The Banks, Highfields and Church Street. The idea, promoted by the developer, is that residents of the new development will leave their cars behind and walk to the shops and schools and will use buses and trains in sufficient numbers that the impact on the local highways network will be reduced. This is not impressive, simply because the developer, however well intentioned , has absolutely no control on residents' travel habits. People are using their cars now and will continue to use them and no amount of 'initiatives' is likely to change that.



Richard is the Principal Beat Officer for Barrow and the Wolds Villages, working in a team with CSO Brian Geeson (featured in the December issue of Barrow Voice). His task is to manage the expectations and concerns of residents in relation to law and order. With a recent (December and January) spate of car thefts and shop breakins, he is currently aiming to reduce this rate of crime by catching those responsible and raising the awareness of residents to improve their own security.

Richard grew up in the local area and attended local schools. He is a real family

man and has three children. The whole family is very involved in the community and he is delighted to be able to work in the area where he has his roots. In addition to involvement with sport, he is very involved with his local church and also used to work with a children's Crusader group.

He worked for five years in the Criminal Justice system in Nottinghamshire. Increasingly, he felt he could make a real difference within the police service and retrained, first as a Community Support Officer in the Melton area and then as a police constable.

Accepting the position in Barrow, Richard commented to me "Residents live in this beautiful and picturesque area with a low level of crime. However, there are people in the community who don't see life as a bed of roses. Many are hidden and hard to reach. I feel I have a particular responsibility to engage with such people and those who are vulnerable and who may have hidden disabilities or difficulties. This means that quite a lot of my time is taken up by visiting offenders, young mothers, the elderly and people with learning disabilities. I also aim to do a lot of long term pro-active work behind the scenes with young people in schools. I want to assist in linking up the work of other agencies, including charities so that we are all working together.



# John Whittaker reflects on life and faith in Barrow

I write these recollections of my time in my new study in a new home in a new parish (Hinckley) and as part of a new community; when a vicar changes jobs it has a big impact on them and their family. And so one big impact has been leaving Barrow after seven wonderful years which I can safely say have been the most enriching and valued years of my working life.

our Barrow Voice editor suggested that I framed these recollections as five things that I feel I have achieved and five special memories I'll take with me. The latter is easy, the former more difficult because ministry is not about us achieving but rather being part of a community and rejoicing when despite our limitations and flaws the grace of God works to bring life and renewal.

So if I can slightly rephrase the first requirement: here are five things in which I have been privileged to be involved with and in which the grace and gifts of God have worked through the working and giving of a whole community:

- 1 At Holy Trinity Church we have seen a strengthening of the involvement of young families, children and young people in our life of faith, worship and service. A Junior Choir regularly meets and contributes to services. A Pram Service on Thursday morning is a great new place for parents of pre school children to meet, enjoy time together and have the opportunity to pray, sing and learn in a format which engages young children and adults alike. A youth group now operates, the attendance at the monthly all age service is high and a weekly Junior Church helps children to grow in their Christian Faith.
- 2 There is a richness and closeness in relationships among the different churches of the villages. We are at a place where we are very pleased that there are different churches offering different styles of worship whilst taking delight in and supporting one another.
- 3 There have been and will be significant developments to the Holy Trinity



Church Building which express a desire to serve the community and make our buildings a gift for use by the village. A raised platform and altar in the middle part of the church enhances the use of the church for services, concerts, school events and much more. During services of communion, by having an altar in the middle of the church rather than at the top, our community has experienced a stronger connection with one another and participation in the service. And the big change to come is the extension on the North side of the church which will support far greater use of the building as well as offering a modern, attractive, accessible community facility for the whole village. Watch this space...

4 I have served on the governing body at Hall Orchard School and believe we

made an outstanding appointment in the current head, Jane McKay who has helped the school improve the progress of all the children with the strong ethos that every child matters and every child should be able to progress to his or her potential.

5 Being a church in our own strength is a shadow of what church can be through the gifts and grace of God. I believe I have witnessed many members of Holy Trinity Church become more orientated towards God and the callings and vision and encouragements and challenges which God offers to us.

# You and Property in Barrow Upon Soar

Have you come back? Are you treading water? Or are you trying to escape?

veryone reading this article knows that Barrow Upon Soar is a beautiful, busy village in the heart of the Charnwood district. But today as you walk around the village you can't help but see a 'For Sale' sign, or a 'Let By' sign or, on roads leading into the village, yellow signs on lampposts pointing to new property in Trinity Park (Miller Homes), Meadow Grange (David Wilson) or Beacon View (Davidson's). All these signs are something that village estate agents Strawberry Lettings and Sales are delighted about; in fact most of the time the 'To Let' signs hardly get dusted off before a property is snapped up by an eager tenant wanting to get their hands on their new temporary home. Even on a rainy January day Nicola Hickinbotham at Strawberry said that on occasion properties in the village are let even before they are fully on the market and have three people bidding for the same house.

But why are people struggling to move around, or get back in, when in January there were over 90 properties for sale and more than 15 to rent? On speaking to residents of Barrow upon Soar it seems that the need to up-size is forcing some out of the village into the surrounding areas such as Sileby and Mountsorrel because the leap from a two up two down terraced house to a three bed semi is too much of a strain on their budget. It is also much harder for the first time buyers to get on the property ladder these days with banks demanding a far greater deposit than just 2 years ago. Although mortgages vary depending on factors such as the type of property and the length of the mortgage, first time buyers need at least 10% nowadays rising to as much as 40% or even 50%! The days of 100% mortgages are long gone.

However, even if you have the money not

all is plain sailing. Sellers from outside Barrow who are fortunate enough to have found a buyer and are eager to purchase their new home in the village, or those wanting to up-size within the village itself are being out bid by investors who are snapping up properties here to rent out. And why wouldn't they when the average 3 bed semi is going for £650 per month? This is unusual; villages are not supposed to have such a roaring rental trade!

Of course Barrow upon Soar is a great place to set down your roots. It has a lively High Street with good shops and all of the main services any family or young couple could need; good rail, bus and road links to local cities and towns in the area and of course some of the best pubs around, all offering great food in superb surroundings. So if you are trying to escape Barrow take a look around you before you decide to leave because getting back in could be a lot harder than you realise. The housing market changes dramatically and getting back to Barrow was certainly difficult in 1978 as Ginny Willcocks well remembers. She writes:

than anticipated as every house we went for, in our price range, we just missed and then there weren't any houses for sale at all. No new build either, believe it or not. Finally, about two weeks before we were due to move out of our Sileby home someone told us about a property on Thirlmere Road which was on the market as a private sale. We joined the queue of prospective buyers. We were quite desperate to get a property at this stage so made a modest bid which we had to increase at least twice but eventually succeeded in getting the house as we were prepared to wait for the occupiers to move.

In the end it took us much longer

We were able to move in with my mother who lived at Loughborough at the time. We thought we'd be with her for 6 weeks. We were actually there for 6 months! BUT we managed to come back to Barrow, a move that neither of us has ever regretted.



# A chilly dip in the pool

he recent article about the uncertain future of the Humphrey Perkins swimming pool has provoked a number of memories of its early days...

#### Doriter Orton and husband Robert consult the Humphrey Perkins Chronicle.

As we both attended Humphrey Perkins School from the late 1950s to 1966 we tried to remember exactly when the pool was built. We were fairly convinced that there was a lot of fund raising!

I consulted old copies of "The Humphrey Perkins Chronicle" and December 1961 tells us that the campaign to collect waste paper and foil bottle tops is worthy of support as there is a real possibility of the-Swimming Pool being built.

Sadly, 1962 is missing but by December 1963 the Chronicle states that the fund has been well supported and the pool has seen a full season's use; however, another fete is envisaged in order to settle the account and provide changing facilities. This suggests that it was built in 1962. It was an open air pool and only the more determined used it!

#### Norman Meeke recalls days as a pupil and teacher

I obviously read your article on the HPHS pool with interest. Here are some answers to your thoughts – I think. Wyn Morris actually started the same day as I at HPHS, which was September 1973 and I believe by that date the roof of the pool was already on as I remember Mr Dunn walking me round on my interview and visiting the pool with roof in situ.

As a pupil starting in 1958, I remember that in the second or third year we started collecting a 'foot' - (12 inches (33cm)) of threepenny pieces as a start to raising money for the new pool. After much fund raising and obvious help from outside agencies I do remember swimming in the open pool before I left in 1965.



The changing rooms were two sheds at the far end.

I also remember going through Mr Dunn's garden to swim in the holidays, but as, at the time, I was going out with his daughter, I may have been luckier than most.

I will be sorry to see the pool close for so much of the year but I do know how much it costs to run. One wonders if closing in the colder parts of the year would make more sense and cost less- but who knows?

#### Robert Mee brings a whole new meaning to breaking the ice.

My school year were some of the first to carry out sponsored walks to help raise money for `The Swimming Pool`. This would have been in the early 1960`s. The pool was just a hole in the ground with a

paving slab surround, a raised slab terrace to one side, a hut for the pump house at the road side and two garden sheds for changing rooms at the far end all surrounded by a timber fence.

It must have been finished late 1965ish because I remember very well having to break the ice before we were allowed in during the spring term and we were allowed to use the pool for relaxation during our O level exams which was in the summer term of 1966. The two photographs which are the only ones I have show a little of what it was like, summer term 1966.

As an aside, my brother who is some seven years younger than me also went to Humphrey's and he and his years went on sponsored walks to raise funds for the roof to be built. He would have left in 1973 so this sort of ties up to your article.

Now the lease has run out and the shop will close. However, Di will continue trading via the website










# A sense of place

Frances Thompson suggests some spring reading which transports you to another place...



Carol, a popular presenter of Gardeners' World, has made her garden in Devon over 30 years and from the original wilderness she has created quite different areas of sun and shade, woodland and more formal beds, which offer opportunities to use a massive diversity of plants. Whether you have rolling acres or a pocket handkerchief, you will find practical know-how here and ideas-a-plenty.

Just out last month, *Home Ground* by Dan Pearson is a delight. If you follow Dan's column in the Observer, you will know that he has recently moved to a farm in the West Country to garden on a grand scale. This book, however, charts 10 years in his London garden and the subtitle A Sanctuary in the City gives a clue to its content. Written and photographed 'in real time', this, as the previous book, moves through the seasons and is a personal recollection, a thoughtful commentary on using plants from around the world to

create an inspirational oasis in an uncompromisingly urban environment. Worth every penny of the £20 it currently costs on Amazon.

Leaving gardening aside, a firmly-rooted sense of place can enrich a novel so that story and setting combine. There are two series of novels I recommend that do this admirably. They both fit loosely into the crime genre but are by no means onedimensional. Ann Cleeves, a very prolific and accomplished writer, has struck gold with her Shetland quartet featuring detective Jimmy Perez: Raven Black, White Nights, Red Bones and Blue Lightning. All set in and around the Shetland Islands, the writer creates a perfect background to the action: isolation, a spare and beautiful landscape, the tension between locals and incomers, plus the rich diversity of tradition and language. If, like me, you find you are hooked on these books, be warned, Blue Lightning is definitely the last in the series.

Closer to home, I discovered Elly Griffiths' East Anglia series when I was staying in North Norfolk: The Crossing Places, The Janus Stone and, The House at Sea's End. I challenge you not to be charmed by Dr Ruth Galloway, a forensic archaeologist whose specialism is bones. Ruth is immensely likeable and the writing is witty and pacey with a brilliant evocation of the Norfolk coastline.

Both these series are best read chronologically to get the most out of them.

- Donna Leon's Venice-based novels featuring Commissario Brunetti
- Peter Temple's *Jack Irish* thrillers and *The* Broken Shore
- Swedish writer, Camilla Lockberg's Patrik Hedstroms novels
- Martin Edward's Lake District series: The Coffin Trail, The Cipher Garden, The Serpent Pool.




