Youth work under threat

ne area which is suffering cuts by the County Council is Youth Work. For the last six years the County Council have run detached youth work, Streetwise, on a Tuesday evening youth group in Barrow under the leadership of Arnie and Mark and in November 2009 a Thursday evening group run by Emma & Jo began.

Each term they have a syllabus of subjects to cover including drug awareness, relationships, domestic violence, sporting events, etc. They give the young people advice concerning training for careers as well. The numbers attending each evening varies but may reach 30 at times.

We have all noticed that the amount of anti-social behaviour in the village has reduced over these years; for example last year the police said that there were no reports of damage to property on Bonfire night, whereas a few years ago there were many. This is a wonderful achievement due to all the village organisations involved with young people including the detached youth work that is aimed at those unlikely to join other groups. Because of the reduction of crime perpetrated by young people in Barrow the village is no longer considered a priority area and for this reason the County Council has decided to stop funding the youth work here.

It is my personal opinion that removing the detached youth work would mean that we see an increase in the number of young people wandering around Barrow at a loose end, young people who have not been given the input that these specially trained youth workers can give. I also believe that we are unlikely to notice any change for a while but that after a few months the number of complaints to the Parish Council and the Police would start rising. The knock-on effect could touch every part of the community including businesses and residents.

Although the County Council was funding Streetwise on Tuesday evenings, the Thursday evening group has been jointly funded by the Parish Council and the Community Association. It is proposed that this joint funding continues to provide one evening of detached youth work for at least the next year and BUSCA is actively seeking funding towards a second evening. The young people of the village deserve the opportunity to benefit from the help, friendships, advice and training that could be on offer; they deserve the backing of the community raising funds for this service. We, the residents of Barrow, deserve to live in a village where all of us, no matter what our age, can avail ourselves of services aimed at improving our quality of life.

New playground opened

Just before Easter the barriers were finally removed from the very splendid new playground on the David Wilson Homes estate on Willow Road. The Mayor of Charnwood, Councillor Jill Vincent cut the ribbon to mark the official opening and then tried out the equipment for herself to give it the civic seal of approval. We watched her swing and slide with enthusiasm. The event was attended by a representative of Barrow Parish Council who worked closely with David Wilson Homes and the Borough Council to plan the area.

he playground was given a big thumbs up by the crowds of eager children who were the first to try out the new equipment. It comprises three main sections; an equipped play area with state of the art swings, slides and various other equipment; a multi-use games area, or MUGA with basketball net and football pitch as well as a natural play area which is formed from natural materials; and in addition, there are picnic benches and wide open spaces which are designed to encourage community interaction and promote traditional community values.

The area will provide a place of fun for children of every age, from toddlers to teenagers as well as space for families to get out into the fresh air.



Improvements at the Health Centre

Dr Simpson, his partners and the staff would like to thank all our patients for their patience and understanding over the last few months during a very difficult and interesting time. We have undergone two major changes at the surgery: firstly, the migration to another computer system and secondly, the refurbishment of the Health Centre.



any of you will have seen the receptionist sat at the kitchen hatch greeting patients whilst dodging ladders and boxes containing equipment and administrative paperwork waiting to be installed in the newly furbished consulting room, and the doctors and nurses not knowing from one day to the next which room they would be working in.

The largest and most expensive piece of equipment was the air handling unit which has been installed in the treatment room. This is now a compulsory piece of equipment needed in any surgery where invasive procedures are performed.

We are very pleased with our new reception which has been designed to give a friendlier approach to the surgery and easier for our disabled patients. The girls are all now wearing uniform as you can see from the photograph and I think you'll agree, very smart they look too. There are still a few finishing touches left to do and we still haven't got to grips with the workings of the automatic doors., but we are hoping they will be done soon, and during our closed time so no more disruptions.

We have introduced a slight change to our appointment system: A limited number of appointments are released the day before for patients to pre-book a morning appointment. If you would like to pre-book a morning appointment call the surgery after 11am the day before. This is a trial and we will be monitoring the usage of these appointments and the effect it has on the queue in the mornings. The Extended Hours are being well received for those of you who find it difficult to get here during

normal working hours and these can be booked online via our website.

We also have another GP coming to work here on a regular basis and we have increased our specialist practice nurse hours in the minor illness clinics to help with the increasing demand.

Sadly we are losing Nurse Karen Davis to New Zealand, but we all wish her and her family every success and happiness in their new lives far away, and we are busy at the moment looking for her replacement.

Congratulations to Janet for 25 years service at the surgery. I'm sure most patients at sometime or other have been helped by Janet and a lot of you have got to know her well.

We are looking to set up a Patient
Participation Group, and are asking for
volunteers to join. Are you interested in
finding out more about Barrow Health
Centre, influencing the development of the
surgery and local health services? If the





BRAG mounts a demo on High Street

When a private meeting was arranged between GVA (Jelson's representative) and the Parish Council before Easter, BRAG jumped at the chance to mount a demonstration outside the PC office.

With a good turnout of placard-waving protestors, no-one could have been in any doubt that Barrow would not welcome yet another big housing development: "Barrow says NO to Jelson" we shouted. Someone brought a megaphone so the car drivers got it too. When they tooted their support, we cheered even louder.

Update from BRAG

ecently, it has been a rather quiet period on local planning although there were some notable applications for developments declined, in Sileby and Rothley, in the weeks before the local elections. The plan for a development of around 300 homes on land off Melton Road, re-submitted by Jelson Ltd last summer, has not returned to an agenda for the Charnwood Borough Council planning committee although, on 26th May 2011, it had its first meeting since the local elections.

We understand that the local highways authority, Leicestershire County Council, has raised concerns with the developer and to date they have not responded. You may recall the original submission from the developer was turned down on nine points of objection in March 2010, mostly on highways related issues. Until the highways authority can give its assessment to the Borough Council no decision on the application will be made. It was open to the developer, after three months without a decision from CBC to make a non-determination appeal. This has not happened. We wonder why?

There is suggestion in the village that other developers are considering planning applications for housing in other parts of the village. Observation of traffic queue counting at the junction of Cotes Road and

North Street/ High Street has added to speculation. At this time no applications for major housing development other than the Jelson application appear for Barrow Upon Soar, on the Borough Councils planning website.

At a recent meeting BRAG members agreed to oppose any further major housing developments in the village from any developer, in particular those which would have the effect of pushing out the built boundaries of the village. We want to see our countryside preserved. Enough is enough in this village.

Tiffany Perkins was the ring leader of the relaxed Loweswater group, sitting in garden chairs sipping wine in the afternoon sun and chatting before playing pin the tail on the donkey. Tiffany had put round fliers sounding out interest and gone ahead when the results



Barrow Upon Soar Methodist Church



The year 2011 is a very special one for Barrow upon Soar Methodist Church as exactly 100 years ago in June 1911 the present church was built for the Primitive Methodist Society.

s was common in most English villages at that time, there were two Methodist congregations -The Wesleyans who followed the rules of John and Charles Wesley and the Primitives or "Prims", a society which was founded by Hugh Bourne in 1810. It appears that Methodists first met in Barrow upon Soar at 10 Church Street and the Wesleyan Methodist Chapel in High Street (then North Street and now the Dentists) can be dated to some time after 1822. However, the Primitive Methodist Church can be more reliably dated as the 1826 Loughborough Circuit Plan includes Barrow upon Soar.

Prims go posh!

In 1820, the Prims worshipped in a converted barn on the same site as our existing North Street (then called Town Street) chapel but in 1910 it was decided to

build a new church. The Trustees were offered land at the top of Warner Street (now Maran's Court) at a cost of 4d per yard but after some discussion it was decided to pull down the barn and build on that site. By this time the farm yard had been put to another use and a public house known as "The Royal Oak" had been built and also a small cottage. The latter was bought from the brewery to be used as the caretaker's house. Plans were drawn up and Messrs Faulkes of Loughborough were awarded the contract for the building at a cost of £900 and by 1911 the building was completed and opened. What a transformation - with central heating and gas lamps - the "Prims" had gone posh!

But, it had to be paid for and money was not plentiful as the average man earned less than £1 per week but in common with most Methodists at that time, they were not deterred. There is a fund raising panel of bricks in the Quiet Room with names or initials engraved on them – the charge for this was 2/6d for initials and 5/- for a full name. Almost every Saturday evening, a social was held but by 1914 there was still a debt of £250. So many had to go into the armed forces that fund raising efforts were suspended and it was not until 1922 that they could be resumed. A bazaar was held on Easter Monday in the Cotes Road School and the sum of £375 was raised – the Church was no longer in debt.

There were plenty of activities during the week with a regular preaching service on Monday evenings, the Good Templars' Lodge on Tuesdays and the Christian Endeavour on Thursdays. The highlight of the year was the "Sermons" or Sunday School Anniversary and when the great day

arrived after much preparation and practice the children would meet before the service at 29 North Street and march in orderly manner across the road to chapel.

Remember, while all this was going on worship and activities were also taking place at the Wesleyan Methodist Chapel just down the road and this church also made a very valuable contribution to Methodism and to the life of our village.

Although Methodist Union had taken place in 1934, there had never been any attempt to apply this to local level until 1964 and it was not until 1968 that a District Commission issued the report that recommended "that the two societies should unite and all services should be held in North Street" and this happened in 1970. Over the next years, the "Royal Oak" and the old prefabricated Hall were demolished and

the new Hall and Coffee Lounge, a patio and garden area built but, more importantly the two societies now became one united Methodist Church, sharing, worshipping and witnessing together in Barrow upon Soar.

Special services

Special services are being held throughout the year to mark this centenary and in February the President of the Methodist Conference, Rev Alison Tomlin shared in worship with us. On Sunday 26 June the preacher at both morning and evening worship will be Rev Dr Stuart Jordan who is Co-Chairman of the Methodist London District. Stuart used to live on North Street and was a member of our Sunday School – a real "Barrow Boy"! Social events have also been organised and a 1911 Tea Party was held in April when members and friends, dressed in Edwardian manner, shared 'afternoon tea', cucumber

sandwiches and cakes.

In August we say goodbye to our present Minister, Rev Jane Carter who is moving to Melton Mowbray. She is not being replaced as the Loughborough Methodist Circuit is being organised into a Team Ministry which will cover ten churches under the guidance of Superintendent Minister, Rev Adam Wells based in Loughborough.

Why not come and share in these celebrations with us? Sunday services are at 10.15 am and 6.00 pm with Messy Church on the fourth Sunday of every month at 4.00 pm followed by a Bring and Share Tea. Our other meetings, Ladies Circle, Happy Hour, Bible Studies etc. are listed on our notice board at the front of the Church or on our website at

www.barrowmethodist.org.uk. Be assured that a warm welcome awaits you.

Building starts in earnest!

After preliminary work as SP and AJ Builders Ltd of Mountsorrel set up their site at Holy Trinity Church in Barrow upon Soar, there was much excitement when the digger finally started to remove the grass and top soil in readiness for building to start. The building of a community facility adjacent to the church has been in the planning stage for several years and fundraising has been on-going for the last four and a half years. The project is costing over £550,000 and whilst there is still some way to go with the fundraising, with the help of a loan, it has been possible to start the build which is expected to be completed mid-December.

The Bengal is top rated with five stars



Football History

The following article appeared in the Souvenir Brochure of the Barrow Old Boys Football Club in August 1969. The brochure was commissioned as a souvenir "upon the first occasion of a football team from Barrow upon Soar being promoted to Division 1 of the Leicestershire Senior League" and "as a means of bringing the existence and activities of the Old Boys' Football Club to the notice of as many as possible of those who live in the village and neighbouring areas."

short history of football at Barrow (from information supplied by G.B. Green and A. E. Perkins)

The village of Barrow upon Soar has a long sporting history; at the end of the 18th century the 'Gentlemen Cricketers of Barrow' were famous well beyond the County boundary, but it seems that football in the village did not become so well established (or recorded?) until late in the 19th century. The population of the village at that time would have been in the region of 1,000 (as compared. with 3,500 - 4,000 today) and their team was known as the Barrow Rising Stars. This team with their headquarters at the Railway Inn, played their football on a pitch near the Mill and even to this day village football is still played 'on the Mill' (floods permitting). The Stars were members of the Loughborough and District League and were obviously formidable opposition. They were winners of Div. I in seasons 1901-2 and 1902-3 and Div. 11 champions in 1911-12. During their career they also won the Bass Charity Cup, the Rolleston Cup and the County Cup. In one particular season, four different trophies came their way.

The Stars were not without local opposition however; the Excelsiors, nicknamed 'the Vultures', were also members of the Loughborough & District League and operated from a ground at Chocolate Hill, Walton Lane. They did not however win any honours during their career and appeared to be the 'poor relations' of the Stars. It was during the early years of this century that a team called the Old Boys first appeared on the scene; this team, which also played down Mill Lane, was comprised mainly of old boys from the village grammar school, but again their record did not compare with the Stars.

Immediately prior to the First World War, another Barrow team was gaining prominence in the village. This team, the Trinity, had become a member of the Loughborough & District League (Div. 1) and was rivalling the Stars for the position of 'top team' in the village. It is interesting to note other local teams in the Loughborough and District League at this period, including Quorn Havelock, Quorn Emmanuel, and four teams from Sileby (Imps,

Excelsior, Amateurs & Vics). By the way, the referees' match fee in 1913 was 2/6 and football boots were then 6/per pair).

The Trinity F.C. had an illustrious career from 1918 onwards, for a period of 12 or 13 years during which time they were winners of the League championship, League Cup competition and the Rolleston Cup.

The Trinity's glories could not however last forever and 1930 saw the advent of 'The Gunners' and 'Barrow Athletic' with the 'Old Boys' reappearing in 1932. They were then members of the

Leics. Mutual League and played, for a while, on a pitch at Cotes Road. In 1938 the Old Boys moved to their present ground at North Street and for a while became members of the Loughborough Alliance.

After the 1939-45 war, the Old Boys were reformed in 1947, following a public meeting at the Working Men's Club, and entered the Leicestershire Senior League.

They made their presence felt almost immediately by reaching the semi-final of the Leics. Senior Cup (whose contestants included Leicester City Reserves) in the season 1947-48, where they met and were defeated by Whitwick Colliery. The Barrow team on this occasion contained many local village names and consisted of K. Swaine, G Witham, T. Brookes, J. Belton, M. Hull, S. James, A. Naylor, K. Williamson, R. Marlow, J. North and A. Williamson.

Since that time, other trophies which have been won by the Old Boys have included the Sileby Cup (1961-62) and the Loughborough Cup (1967-68). In addition of course, the Old Boys were runners-up in the Div 11 of the Senior League (1968-69), losing only three matches throughout the season.



Claire, Stella and Walton Lodge Farm

In the accompanying photo, Claire's on the right, Stella's on the left and the family terrier, Millie just squeezed in between them! Although the gorgeous Stella, is Claire Necchi's latest love, Claire has lived with horses most of her life and has a deep understanding of their needs. Although there are also Dexter Cattle, sheep and chickens at Walton Lodge Farm, it's the horses that take pride of place in her affections. A deep understanding of the way horses differ is most important because Claire takes great pride in running a high class livery yard that caters for each horse as an individual. The basis for this however is a strict routine; this way all the horses know what happens and when! Claire says all horses have an uncanny sense of time, which is paramount especially when feeding.



The word livery is a rather strange one but it means that horses can stay in a stable and be looked after as long as the owner pays up – either weekly or monthly. The number of horses at 'Full Livery' at Walton Lodge varies from between six and 10 as do the charges from £75 to £95 a week. This includes everything except vet's and farrier's fees. Many stables not only offer 'Full Livery' but also 'D.I.Y.' where owner riders go in every morning and evening to do all the mucking out, feeding and grooming themselves. This reduces the weekly bill substantially but it's very time consuming for the owners. Claire doesn't offer a 'D.I.Y.' service because she says people coming at different times, upsets the routine and the horses. Claire prides herself that her owners have complete trust in her ability

to care for their horses and appreciate her attention to detail. They also prefer to keep their horses on a yard that does not use fertilizers or weed killers. Many have kept their horses there year after year with one clocking up over 12! She spoke with confidence when she said that although horses do leave her care, it's never because the owners are dissatisfied, only that their circumstances have changed.

You can have lessons here too but only if you have your own horse. Walton Lodge Farm isn't your standard riding stables even though Claire is a Registered B H S I I qualified instructor. She's happy to teach novices with their own horses or ponies to help improve their basic paces, position and understanding, including jumping up to about three foot fences. But once

they've mastered basic dressage skills and perhaps competed in some novice competitions, and they wish to move on to a higher level, she passes them on to trainers who are more specialist in the different disciplines. Claire herself, before she married, used to compete in the demanding discipline of eventing. Many readers who've enjoyed watching Burghley and Badminton Horse Trials over the years will recognise the name of the Olympic rider Lucinda Green, nee Lucinda Prior-Palmer. Claire laughs as she says, 'I beat her once at Locko Park in Derbyshire way back in 1979! I had a very good dressage and double clear inside the time and won!'.

The proximity of the Prestwold Estate is a great advantage too as once off her own land anyone can use the designated wide verges around the estate and all the bridle paths. The farm is undoubtedly in a super position for any length of hack, with the use of about 12 miles of tracks. Claire says that they have numerous choices of circuits and never have to turn around to come back which is fantastic.

After the horses - the small sturdy Irish Dexter Cattle are the second favourites. There are 13 on the farm at present, initially brought in to take advantage of the grass the horses didn't need. These animals are special and have a very distinctive flavour to their meat because they get fat on grass alone and were therefore never given the feed supplements which caused such havoc in the 1980's. Dexter cows have never been infected with BSE!! The meat is dark and delicious: I've cooked a roast and can guarantee it had a wonderful flavour. Claire sells privately 'from the farm gate'. If you too would like to try her meat then send her an e-mail: claire.necchi@sky.com and you'll be added to the mailing list. The meat in reality is organic, but the herd is not certified due to the cost of becoming registered being prohibitive for such a small concern. You will be contacted when a steer has been slaughtered and there is meat for sale. It's sold, roughly butchered, in mixed boxes of approximately one kilo joints, starting from 5 kilos. Then all you have to do is drive up Walton Lane, turn in to Walton Lodge Farm and collect your box!




