# Major Housing Development Proposals - an Update

#### Jelson Homes plan refused

At a meeting of Charnwood Borough Council Plans committee held on 7th December 2010 a re-submission of an application by Jelson Homes to build around 300 houses on land off Melton Road, behind Breachfield Road was refused permission. This follows refusal of permission for the same site in March 2010. The reason for refusal is the unsafe design of the Grove Lane/ Sileby Road/ South Street junction which has poor visibility for traffic leaving Grove Lane, particularly when turning right towards South Street. We want to collect accident and 'near miss' information for this sub standard junction. See cut the out slip on page 3.



#### Member of Parliament Requests Call-In

BRAG alerted Nicky Morgan MP to the Charnwood Borough Council's case officer's report on the Jelson application which did not adequately explain to the members of the Plans Committee a possible option for rejecting the application on the basis of prematurity prior to the development of the Borough's own Core Strategy for developments. Mrs Morgan, having read the report, referred it to the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government, Eric Pickles for him to use his powers to Call In the application. This would have removed the decision making from Charnwood Borough Council, but in the event the plan was refused, so the Call In was not needed.

#### So what happens now?

We wait to see. At the time of writing, February 2012, we were not aware of any request by the developer to appeal although it is expected within six months after the refusal of permission. If there is a planning enquiry, BRAG, is advised that professional representation would cost around £5000 and we have less than £500 at this time although we are looking at ways to raise funds. #### Strancliffe Hall, Cotes Road

In December 2011, Barwood Homes submitted an application to Charnwood Borough Council to build 76 houses on land around Strancliffe Hall. This site has a Grade 2 listed building and is an area of attractive parkland with a range of wildlife, although within the village boundaries.

Nearby residents organised a public meeting on 19 December 2011, attended by around 50 residents and they were advised on how to raise an objection on relevant grounds, known as material considerations. # BUSCA plans launch of a vastly improved Barrow Signpost directory website

n 2006, BUSCA published a splendid new booklet as a welcome pack to all the new residents moving into the Willow Road and other developments. It was also available free for residents to pick from dispensers all over Barrow. At the same time, we built a new website to provide the means of keeping the directory up to date. You can find the website on www.barrowsignpost.info

Just before Christmas we ran out of the paper copies and needed to make a decision about the future of the directory. It is a village resource that we feel is really valuable. It is full of useful information about Barrow services, community group contacts, school and church details, sports facilities and much more. It is arranged in a way that is quick and easy to find. The original website has been kept up to date but has not been as fully used as it might be - it isn't found easily on a web search because it was constructed at a time before sophisticated algorithms played such a major part in non-brand search.


We have made the decision to scrap the paper copy because it would be out of date even before it had been printed. We'll keep its covers as a welcome pack and container for village leaflets but our main project is to vastly improve the website. It will still have the address www.barrowsignpost.info but will be much easier to find on any search engine when you put in Barrow upon Soar. It will also give the facility for individuals to update their own information. In that respect, it will be very similar to the village website, www.barrowuponsoar.org.uk which is so heavily used and which can be kept up to date by designated members of a community group or business. The content and function of the two websites is very different. The Signpost is a summary of contact details, times and meeting places etc. That is, it is a true directory. The village website has much more information about what community groups do, descriptions of their activities, their aims, what businesses specialise in etc.

It isn't set up for a quick search of basic facts. We hope to put a lot of links between the two sites so you can flip seamlessly between the two.

We are delighted that the entire project has been generously funded by Barrow Parish Council, David Wilson Homes, a Wolds Community Forum grant, Lafarge, British Gypsum and Brett Landscapes. We offer our sincere thanks to them on behalf of BUSCA.

The improved site will go live during the spring and we will be inviting you to a launch in the library to see it in action and to invite you to sign up to be a Content Editor or even an Administrator with the site. Keep your eyes and ears open!



# Janet Thompson shares 44 years of memories at Barrow library

anet was born and lived in Leicester and initially came to work in the offices at Driver's factory in 1962 when they transferred their Head Office from King Street, Leicester. She now admits she hadn't got a clue where Barrow upon Soar was but remembers travelling each day by train and buying a return ticket at the pre-decimal price of 2/11d. Janet and her then fiancé, Michael both worked at Drivers and when they married in June 1963 they moved into one of Driver's cottages in Sileby Road and later to Babington Road where they brought up their three daughters, Catherine, Leigh and Natalie.

Our library has not always been where it is, having been previously housed from 1961 in 'The Stable' which was attached to the former Fox Inn on North Street. Mary Payne and Des North were part time assistants and Janet remembers Des parking her pram, with daughter, Gillian in it, outside on the pavement and leaving her to sleep.

Janet has worked at Barrow upon Soar Library since August 1968 a month after it opened in its present position in North Street. It was staffed by Mary Payne, Madge Wilkinson and Janet and they were later joined by Joan Bull. Mary Payne also completed over 40 years long service with Leicestershire Libraries retiring about 14 years ago when Janet Widdowson joined the team.

In the early days the job consisted of issuing and discharging books. Any queries had to be dealt with by the Librarian who was attached to the library and visited regularly. A microfiche reader was given to the Library by Rev Stephen Mitchell, together with comprehensive Parish Records of Baptism, Marriages and Burials for Barrow and Walton. John Nurse has since put these records onto the internet for public use, a job which took him four years to complete. We now have access to them online on the Barrow upon Soar site of the Leicestershirevillages.com together with census and other records. For those interested in family history the Library Service also offers free access on their library computers to Ancestry.com

The library is a good place to surf the internet and has had users from as far away as Canada, when they've been visiting Barrow on holiday.

There have been some unusual events down the years such as when one of the regular librarians (who shall be nameless) brought his roller skates with him and proceeded to skate round the library one evening. Dr John Earl regularly used to issue a patient with a prescription form on which he had



written the name of a book on self-help for nerves and instructed them to request it from the library. There was also a time when a lady was so busy chatting after borrowing a book that as she left she put her eggs on the roof of the car, got in and drove right down to River View, amazingly with all the eggs intact.

Our current library was fully refurbished in 2009 and there is a twice weekly delivery to make sure that stock is turned over on a regular basis and requests are delivered quickly. Barrow upon Soar Library is part of the Birstall group along with Anstey, Mountsorrel, Quorn, Sileby and Rothley. Books are swapped between these libraries and there is a careful check for any damaged books which are removed from the shelves and either sold or recycled.

Compared with the early days when there was very little choice for children, the library now has a wonderful range for youngsters and they are well catered for. There is a good link between the library and Hall Orchard Primary School and Clare Allen, Head of *continues on page 13*  English, has brought Year 6 pupils for visits on a regular basis which also meant that Janet's five grandchildren paid an extra visit! This has recently been expanded to include Year 5 and now visits are also made by toddlers from the new Lime Tree Day Nursery.

Nowadays, of course, everything is computerised and members have a plastic library card which is shown for borrowing. The major libraries like Loughborough have self-issue machines and renewing and ordering books can be done online, from the comfort of one's own home. E books are a new addition and can be downloaded onto electronic readers, although not onto a Kindle, which must be a built in way of controlling the Kindle user's purchasing choices!

There will be some cutbacks from 2 April and our library is to have its hours cut by 10 per week, but compared with other places we have been let off lightly. It is up to us to continue to use it - watch out for the new timetable!

As she retires Janet knows that she will miss the people most and the social aspect of the job. She can remember Mr and Mrs Moss, who were regular borrowers until a few years ago, saying 'this is not just a library, it is a social club' which says it all.

We wish her a long and happy retirement.

# Tina Long : A tribute

Tina was born at Woodhouse Eaves, on the 27th July 1932, the daughter of a farmer, so she was a true country girl, growing up on a working farm. On her marriage to Chris Long in 1954, her father gave her a cow as a wedding present, and this was to be the start of their small holding. Tina and Chris's first home was a former café, a long wooden bungalow on Nottingham Road. It was from here that they served tea and cakes to passing cyclists on Sundays. Eventually Chris & Tina had a new bungalow built by the Barrow firm of Perkins. Many people will remember buying their fresh eggs and chickens, and of course the turkey at Christmas. The midnight oil was certainly burnt then, with Chris & Tina plucking and drawing the turkeys so that the residents of Barrow and further afield could enjoy their festive meals. I wonder if their two daughters, Christina & Jenny were encouraged to get involved.

It was around 1986 that Tina was elected as chair of Bishop Beveridge Club and what a driving force she proved to be! One of her first tasks was to purchase new crockery and cutlery. Until this point members had been using oddments brought from home. Next on the agenda were new chairs and carpet, but the greatest thing was the kitchen extension. Tina showed great determination to achieve all of these things, and stayed on as chair until 2007, giving over 20 years service to the club.

There were many strings to Tina's bow. One of her of loves was to hear bells ringing, and although she couldn't manage to ring the church bells herself, she did join the hand bell ringing team and enjoyed her time with them immensely. I think for many people the lasting memory of Tina will be of her famous pickles and chutneys. Customers would place their orders well in advance, to ensure that they didn't miss out. Every year at the switching on of the Christmas lights, Tina would be there on the High street, with the

Bishop Beveridge stall laden with her pickles and chutneys, and you had to move pretty quickly to be in with a chance of securing a jar because they sold like hot cakes. The most amazing thing is, Tina didn't like pickles of any kind, so Chris was her taster in chief. Soup was another forte of Tina's, and Mr Brooker would give her his spare vegetables and these would be turned into delicious soup to be used at the Bishop Beveridge and Lent lunches.

Tina sadly passed away on 22 of November 2011. As an adoptive daughter of Barrow, she served her village well, and she will be sorely missed by a great number of people.

# Fresh faces for Barrow: introducing PC Richard Gosling and PCSO Stu Venables

2012 has brought two new faces to policing for Barrow. Both PC Richard Gosling and PCSO Stu Venables moved to Barrow's Neighbourhood Policing Team in November and have been busy getting to know their patch of Barrow, Burton, Walton, Wymeswold, Cotes, Hoton and Prestwold. That's a lot of cycling when they don't have the car.

I met them in January to welcome them to Barrow, introduce them to Barrow Voice and have a good chat. I found out a bit about what makes them tick including their priorities and ambitions for the area as well as their backgrounds.

Richard is a Nottinghamshire lad who, after a number of years in sales, account management and customer service achieved his childhood dream of becoming a policeman. He had appreciated the importance of maturity and life experience before taking the plunge in 2009.

Rather similarly, Stu worked in the flooring industry in Leicestershire for 10 years before joining the police force in 2006, but he joined as a Special Constable while still carrying on with his full time job. Having gained an insight into what it entailed, Stu gave up the flooring and became a PCSO attached to the Birstall Neighbourhood Policing Team. He became very involved with the Youth Café which was set up, very successfully, to tackle a serious level of antisocial behaviour in Birstall.

Richard and Stu work to together to combat crime and antisocial behaviour in the whole large Barrow area. They work with partner agencies such as Social Services, the Health Service and the local councils to help improve the quality of life of residents and service users. Their current top priority is to engage with young people at every available opportunity in order to build positive



relationships and make sure that young people understand how antisocial behaviour affects the lives of people in the area. Stu is particularly interested in using restorative justice for low level offences to keep people out of the courts and avoid criminalisation, especially of young people.

I asked them to tell me something a bit more light hearted. I discovered that Stu's pet hate is zigzag parking (offenders: beware!!) while Richard's is drugs. Richard's pet love is (armchair) football but Stu's is pizza. Stu is very likely to fall off his bike in snowy weather whereas Richard is unbearable just after Notts County have lost (again) so you'll notice that monthly beat surgeries will always be on Saturday mornings.

Richard and Stu describe themselves as very approachable, friendly and willing to listen to local issues. They want to be sure that people feel comfortable to make contact and talk. If you want to arrange to meet either Richard or Stu you can email them:

Richard's collar number is 2983 and Stu's is 6438. They would particularly like to encourage anyone who feels that they are at risk in anyway to contact them to arrange an informal meeting.

Helen from Barrow post office has asked us to give Stu a big thank you for all the support he has given over the past few difficult weeks.

# Strancliffe Hall - past and uncertain future

he Barrow Voice team thought it would be a good idea to record something about Strancliffe Hall, as it stands at the moment, because a developer has applied for planning permission to build a considerable number of properties in the grounds of this Grade 2 listed building.

As far as I'm concerned Strancliffe has always held a kind of mystery as I've never been up close to the building but have always tried to catch a glimpse of this grand house, through the trees and shrubbery that surround it, from the pavement on Cotes Road. It remains mysterious as it's so well concealed you can hardly see anything of it from the road especially since the grounds have been neglected over the past couple of years.

You can discover the detail of the building from the internet as it's a listed building. You can also see an aerial view of the property and the surrounding area including the extensive grounds and gardens. I decided to do some investigating to see what I could discover about the people who have lived there since it was built in 1868.

The title 'Strancliffe Hall' makes the property sound very grand and it certainly is an astonishing size but it hasn't always been known by this title. According to the census of 1871 the house was called Shorncliffe House, Katsic Lane. It was occupied by Mr George Braund, his wife Anne, son George, daughter Agnes and George's niece Annie. In addition to the family there were three domestic servants and in a property nearby, probably a lodge or gatehouse, there was a groom/gardener. It is likely that the house was built for Mr Braund who was a hosiery manufacturer with at least one factory in Loughborough which was situated somewhere in the Woodgate area.

In the next census, of 1881, the house is recorded as Strancliffe Lodge and in the next it's called just 'Strancliffe' but in 1901 the house has no title at, it's just listed as a property on Catsick Road and is still occupied by the Braund family with the addition of Agnes's husband. Mr Braund senior is recorded as being aged 88 in 1901 but by 1911 the Braunds had left and the property was occupied by Brevet Colonel Murray Venables Hilton, retired.

I don't have details about when the family of Colonel Hilton moved into Strancliffe but they were definitely living at Strancliffe House (census detail) in 1911. The colonel lived there with his wife Dora, his three young daughters, Clare, Emily and Beryl plus his widowed mother. The rest of the household consisted of a governess, a cook, a house maid, a parlour maid, a lady's maid, two nurses and a sick nurse and the Lodge provided accommodation for a coachman/domestic.

Colonel Murray V Hilton retired from the army on September 27th 1905. His service had been with the Worcestershire Regiment where he had risen through the ranks from his first commission as 2nd Lieutenant reaching Lieutenant Colonel in 1900. However, whilst living in Barrow he was recalled to the army on 5th August 1914 at the start of the First World War. As a temporary Colonel he commanded the 2nd Battalion East Lancashire Regiment and was killed in action whilst commanding that regiment on 20th October 1915. He was 59 years old. I have not been able to discover the battle in which he died but know that he is buried in Le Touret Military Cemetery, Richebourg-L'Avoue in France and is remembered on the war memorial in Barrow.

I'm still trying to find out when Mrs Hilton left Strancliffe but it was probably not long after her husband was killed. As there are no further census records publicly available, my knowledge of other residents is very limited. I do know that another hero of the First World War was a



resident. He was William Spurrett Fielding Johnson and he was certainly living there in 1931 as was his father who sadly died at Strancliffe on 11th October 1931. He was Thomas Fielding Johnson Junior, the son of the famous Leicester philanthropist.

I also know that a Major Spalding (I think it was 'Major') lived there. His family, I believe, were the Spaldings of Griffin and Spalding, the department store in Nottingham. I know that Thomas (Tommy) Towle, local hosiery manufacturer and his family lived there in the 1950s and that's the extent of my knowledge. I would love to hear from anyone who can provide any more details about the people who have been fortunate enough to call this amazing building 'home'. If you can help by providing any more information or if you have any photographs of the building in the past, please can you get in touch. It would be good to have a more complete picture of the people who have lived here during the 20th century to date. Thank you.

I understand that there are objections to the current planning application to develop this site so there is a chance that it may remain as it is. I've recently read the Heritage Impact Assessment carried out for the developer, Barwood. It states, 'In summary, we consider the proposed scheme will not relatively impact the setting of Strancliffe Hall'. The plan proposes to build 76 properties on the land around Strancliffe. What do you think?

# **Try a touch of Central Asia:** go to Sileby - rent a yurt!

here's a new attraction at 'The Green Place' in Sileby and they'd love you to come and see it especially if you need to find a good place for a lively children's birthday party, an intimate wedding reception, hold a workshop or just have a meeting in a unique tent space. It's a 'yurt'; a portable dwelling very similar to a Mongolian 'ger'

Yurts are perfect structures to build in a place devoted to being kind to the environment as they simply rest on the earth, unlike tents, which you have to peg firmly in. And although from the outside they look quite small their appearance is deceptive as once inside there's plenty of space for a wood burning stove, low seats, little tables and oriental rugs. The interior is warm, welcoming, unique and most of all fun - what more could you ask of a party base? Just outside the yurt is the Green Place garden with its large lawn for games and seats for general relaxation. Certainly a yurt party will beat a Loughborough based burger party hands down!

It takes about an hour to put up a yurt; perhaps even less if you're a Turkic nomad but rest assured at The Green Place the yurt is already erected on its own area of decking within the garden itself. However, if you are interested in



having a yurt party at home it can be taken down and re-erected on your own lawn.

Putting up a yurt is very disciplined. First of all a circular lattice frame is put up and then the roof added which is made up of bent wooden rafters. A 'tuynuk' is the name given to the wheel like central crown into which the bent rafters are slotted. Everything is secured with ropes in a very precise order - wrong order - no yurt! Finally, in Sileby, a canvas wall and roof covering is placed around and over the wooden structure but on the steppes of Central Asia it is a little different. There the covering is made of felt, wool or animal skins. Yurts are strong too. Their squat shape can withstand 70 mile an hour winds as the air flows over them pressing them into the ground not blowing them over. It's a very clever design.

The cost of renting the yurt will vary depending on whether you wish to rent the yurt on its own or to request party catering from the Green Place Cafe as well. When not being used for a special event the yurt will become a summer extension of this cafe. Another



regular use will be as a Kinder Cafe a place where children can be encouraged to read and play whilst their parents enjoy a coffee and cake.

The Green Place opening hours from March 3rd to December are from 10 a m to 4pm Weds, Thurs and Fridays and Sats. An inaugural celebration for its new yurt will be held in March. # What do you like best about the magazine?

I've made some great friends (most of whom have been involved for much longer than me) and I enjoy working alongside a group of people who are not only really passionate about what they do but are good fun to be around too!

# What was the most memorable issue for you?

It has to be the first one I designed to include a new look front cover I guess. I have always wanted to improve the look and presentation of Barrow Voice over the years and it really helped to take the artworking to a digital format using Quark Express as opposed to the conventional paste board format that existed when I first got involved.

#### If you were marooned on a desert island what 5 things would you take with you and why?

My wife Jackie, my daughters Olivia and Kaitlin, Kaitlin's bunny for bedtime and Kaitlin's guinea pigs (sorry I know that is 6 but who would I leave?).

#### How long have you lived in Barrow and why did you decide to come and live here?

Jackie and I lived in Barrow from 1994 till 1999. I attended Humphrey Perkins School in the early 80's and know the area well. We are still involved in the Panto Group and if I had my way we would move back to the village again tomorrow.

#### What would be your ideal holiday?

Tuscany with the family - great climate, food, culture, language, people, history, beaches, countryside, and it's relatively cheap. Easy to get to from East Mids airport and if the Giro was passing through then even better.

#### Do you have a day job? If so what do you do? If not, what did you do?

I have an all consuming job and that is running my marketing services business called Mulberry Square from our offices in Mountsorrel. It actually started out as Piano Street Print Solutions from our home on Warner Street in Barrow in 1997 until I merged that print management business with a design agency in 2003 and we created Mulberry Square.

We look after the marketing of lots of organisations and that generally involves branding, websites, printed literature and to a large extent nowadays, internet marketing.

I am pretty indebted to Barrow and Barrow Voice as it has played a huge part in helping my business grow. My first employee, Ian Bursill, lived on Nottingham Road. We met through him volunteering to build and run the first Barrow Voice website. James Thompson is running our web development department and has been with us for the last 7 years. I first met James and his buddies in 1995 through the Barrow Panto Group when he was 13!

# What are your hopes for the future of Barrow Voice?

In this current climate sustainability is key. Judith has recognised a downturn in advertising revenue but it is really important that we maintain the values we have succeeded in attaining with Barrow Voice. We are very lucky that we have a good group of people involved and of course we wouldn't be where we are today without our volunteers who handle the distribution. All I can hope for is that the magazine remains as loved and appreciated as it is today.

# Barrow Pre-School Playgroup Celebrates 40 Years!



B arrow Pre-School playgroup is now in its 40th year. Although much has changed throughout this time, there are distinct similarities between the 70's and today. The many and varied learning opportunities open to all children remain as

does as the immense fun and enjoyment that the children gain from each session. The caring environment and sense of belonging is as strong today as it has ever been. The dedication and hard work of staff and committee members has been crucial to the development and success of the playgroup.

#### Past

Barrow Playgroup was formed in 1971 with the first session taking place on the 6th October. It was the brainchild of Judith Rodgers who with others opened the first playgroup session. Judith recalls: 'At the beginning, the Methodist premises were dark and dingy and small. The toilets were outside. We probably had about 20 children per session with two supervisors. Although we did manage to buy new equipment (a very posh wooden climbing frame was what we were most proud of), we scrounged other establishment's cast offs (infant chairs and tables rescued from the bonfire heap somewhere towards Leicester), made our own (Wendy House with blue and white check curtains and painting easels), used a bit of ingenuity to achieve an indoor sand and wet play area because we had no outdoor access (builders polythene sheeting and fibre glass mixing troughs) and persuaded people to give us their children's outgrown books and toys. I bought a set of beech wood blocks for £20. I saw them in a catalogue recently for over £200. The smallest blocks were about 30cm square and must have weighed two or three kg each. The bigger ones were 75cm long and weighed about five - six kg each. They were banned after a fortnight of bruised toes, squashed fingers and a lot of tears.

But it was terrific. There was always lots of variety in what was put out at different times of the morning; there was always something creative to do, usually after morning milk (free) and biscuit; always a quiet story time often with finger glove puppets and joining in; very often a time when we all sang new and old nursery rhymes; and the older ones were helped with jigsaws and other prereading and number games. The supervisors were so patient, imaginative and dedicated. The children just loved them.

Actually, I guess it wasn't really very different from now.

#### Present

Today Barrow Pre-School Playgroup is still held at the Methodist Church Rooms every week day morning from 9.15-12.15, term time only. The Playgroup offers care for children aged between 2 1/2 years to 5 years. The children are organised into two groups; the younger children are the 'ducks' and the older children are the 'rabbits'. Each group begins the morning in their own room where activities are set out and the staff are ready for action! Throughout the morning they have the opportunity to move between the rooms enabling them to mix with all children and adults.



The emphasis is on early literacy, numeracy and the development of personal and social skills. There is a broad curriculum of play opportunities open to all children, with a wide range of toys, imaginative play and craft activities. Great fun is had by all and children regularly bring home their masterpieces! There is also an outdoor area where the children can enjoy different activities and also the sunshine during the warmer months. The children love learning and singing traditional nursery rhymes as well as other seasonal songs and the annual Christmas Sing Song is a highlight and not to be missed!

Mid morning the children can have a healthy snack and drink and sit with their friends as well as members of staff. The children display great concentration and delight when helping to distribute pieces of fruit and other tasty snacks amongst their peers.

Playgroup is a registered charity and has a committee of parent volunteers who assist with the administration of the Playgroup. To run each session, the Playgroup employs highly qualified and enthusiastic staff committed to the children and their welfare.


# Hall Orchard Summer Fayre 2012



# **Humphrey Perkins Chronicle**



Some years ago Humphrey Perkins School published a regular magazine called the Humphrey Perkins Chronicle giving the reader an update of the latest developments along with interesting news from the School. This article is a mini Chronicle. As you are no doubt aware Humphreys has seen some significant changes over the last 12 months. I shall briefly outline some of these changes and update you on our plans for the future.

As a school our primary focus is on the children that are in our care. I have rapidly built on the work of the previous 21 headteachers of the school in promoting a values based organisation. Our values are to have a 'Child Focus' and empower 'World Class Learners' with an ethos of 'Honesty, Integrity and Professionalism' and an attitude of 'Serving Others' and a belief that there is 'No Ceiling' to what can be achieved. We don't always get it right, but we strive to learn and improve. This has been particularly important to us as we have created many new roles within the school to ensure that we have the right environment for pupils aged 11 to 16.

Returning to 11-16 education is an exciting journey for us - it will enable pupils to be supported by us to achieve their potential in their GCSEs. Preparations have been in place for a number of years to recruit the right staff and refresh the skills of those who have been at the school for some time. Becoming an academy on the 1st January has given us the freedom to create a learning experience that is academically rigorous, inspiring and a great preparation for the future.

Our sons and daughters live in a society where there is much less certainty, greater diversity of belief and custom, and much more accessible instantaneous global communication than we ever experienced at their age. To deliver education in the same way to pupils today as we had it delivered to us would not provide the skills and experiences that our society needs in the future. The responsibility of this unique opportunity in creating a world class curriculum only comes along once in a lifetime, and we are taking it very seriously. Bringing experience of national best practice to Humphreys has enabled us to look at an exciting educational

experience that blends creativity, the world of work, communication and leadership, the latest mobile computing technology with traditional values and tried and tested outstanding pedagogy. In short the curriculum will be broad and balanced giving every pupil the foundation for success that they deserve.

We have returned to our previous school motto of 'Honeste Audax' (nobly daring) and have four new Houses, these are Belvoir, Chatsworth, Hardwick and Kedleston. Each of these houses has a colour and an emblem taken from the two shields in the stained glass windows of the old library. Our pupils already collect House Points and take part in inter-house competitions. In September the uniform at Humphreys returns to the blazer and tie for new pupils joining the school, updated from the uniform from 1927 left to me by Mr Keeble, a previous Headmaster. From sensible shoes up, our new uniform will be smart and also cost effective.

From September we are introducing a new reading programme for pupils. This also gives us the opportunity to rethink our library provision. The current 'old library' is rather small and the stock of books is not what we would want, particularly for older pupils. Over the next year or so we are looking to create a more extensive resource of 'real' books to compliment a growing trend of reading electronic material.

I do hope that this has sparked your interest in what we are doing at Humphreys. As we continue to go from strength to strength we will keep you updated.

# The cracker-jack Kenneths

arol and Gordon Kenneth have decided to take a rest from directing the Barrow Youth Theatre, and Barrow Voice would like to mark their achievements over the past nine years.

In 2003, Barrow's long-standing Panto Group had an influx of new young members, and a decision was made to start a separate youth theatre alongside it. The Kenneths took the task on and - with important support from Marie Slater as musical director - quickly established an impressive company. They have since staged one play and eight musicals in the Humphrey Perkins auditorium.

Bare statistics cannot convey their achievement. These productions are a major feat of management. Each involves 70 or more individuals, with 45 youngsters on stage and people of all ages tackling the related activities: stage management, scenery painting, making the outstanding costumes (Julie Crossley and Rose Bennett) and props, playing in the band, operating sound and lights, selling and promoting. This is a heartening community activity. The amount of talent coming from one small area is an eye-opener.

On stage, children may start as young as seven and stay until they are thrown out at 18 (though they often return in adult guise to help out). There is always a waiting-list for new entrants. Unusually for junior theatre, plenty of boys participate.

The youth theatre sometimes resembles a club. Friendships are formed there (and the constant chattering drives Carol and Gordon to distraction!). But the main business is taken very seriously, as participants get expert advice on how to act (and react), to sing and to dance. The company is also about life skills. Unruly newcomers learn how to be in the right place for their cues. Young people gain the self-confidence to appear before a packed hall - no small matter. They must accept the ups and downs of casting: the adrenalin rush of starring roles, but also the disappointment of minor parts.

All of us who have participated in the Youth Theatre owe Carol and Gordon an enormous debt of gratitude - for their energy, organisation, flair and forbearance, and for giving us such fun. You can see from the appended comments what it has meant to us. Along with all Barrow citizens we can look forward to future productions from the company they have made so special. They are delighted that Abi Crossley, currently directing Barrow Panto Group's Puss in Boots, is going to take up the reins that they have relinquished. She will shortly begin rehearsals for Disney's Alice in Wonderland.




