

### BRAG: 'Welcome turn' in Melton Road fight

The appeal by Jelson Homes against the decision of Charnwood Borough Council to refuse permission to build around 300 units on land at Melton Road, The Breaches, took an unexpected but welcome turn in June.

The request by the applicant, Jelson Homes, for the appeal to be held on the basis of written submissions was refused by the National Planning Inspectorate who made a decision to hold the inquiry as a full Public (Planning) Inquiry.

The Inspectorate said their decision is based on the extent of local opinion, together with the issues that are likely to arise. This did not find favour with Jelson who immediately made a plea to the Inspectorate to change its decision in their favour.

They said the representations from individuals and households reflect those sent during the determination of the application. As such, they have been robustly considered by the Council's officers and members in the past. We do not agree and neither, it seems, does the Inspectorate!

The date for the Public Inquiry is given as 9th, 10th and 11th October, 2012 at Loughborough Town Hall. BRAG will be professionally represented by Landmark Planning consultants, Barrow Parish Council will be represented through a barrister and Charnwood Borough Council has a legal team to counter the legal representation on behalf of Jelson. The appeal inspector will write a report and a final decision will be made by Eric Pickles, the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government. We have no date for decision. BRAG would like to see as many of the residents of this village as possible attend the public inquiry.

### Strancliffe Hall, Cotes Road development

At its meeting on 21st June 2012, Charnwood Borough Council planning committee voted for permission to be given to Barwood homes to build 72 houses around Strancliffe Hall on Cotes Road.

This development was opposed by BRAG, by Barrow Parish Council and by a number of local residents.

The Borough Council's senior ecology officer was also strongly opposed to the development because of the impact on wildlife, mainly badgers and bats. There are possible drainage and flooding issues with the site too.

For BRAG, Mike Tansey presented a strong case for refusal on ecological and highway safety grounds and for the latter cited the number of traffic accidents involving children from Humphrey Perkins School and the grid locking at Cotes Road after school closes in the afternoons. Barwood has an obligation to build affordable homes but doesn't wish to at Strancliffe. The developer proposes building them elsewhere in the borough.

In BRAG's view a better option would have been to refuse permission, based on insufficient information provided on the drainage system rather than grant permission and hope to resolve this later.

That was, in fact, a proposal made by the Environment Agency. Failure to achieve a resolution will mean the whole application returning to CBC planning committee before any work can begin.

### Proposed new housing near the Three Crowns.

#### Housing to replace parking and toilets at the Three Crowns?


Anyone walking up Church Street on a weekday at the start and end of the school day can testify to its being a very busy place, and this is true of both cars and pedestrians. With many residents of this and neighbouring streets having no off-road parking, the opportunities to stop safely here are limited. This is why a steady stream of parents and children make their way daily across the road to the car parking behind the Three Crowns.

The car park is also well-used by churchgoers, shoppers, and is used by residents of the houses which back on to this area. However, this may not be an option for much longer for any of these groups of people. Charnwood District Council has received an application for outline planning permission to demolish the toilets and build four two-storey houses on the land occupied by them and the current car park. While this is of particular concern to local residents on North Street, Cotes Road and Woodside (where access to the houses is proposed), the loss of this parking (and the amenity of the public toilets) has a wider impact on the village generally. Residents in the centre of the village could find their streets choked with cars and vans. Use of the car parks behind the Cooperative and at the

old station will increase significantly. Will shoppers go elsewhere if they cannot park nearby?

Residents have made many objections (including a 100 signature petition) and Barrow Parish Council has also objected on a number of grounds, including the access via Woodside. 

### **Barrow Signpost;** new, improved and on a web-site near you

ver the last nine months, BUSCA has been engaged in a project to update the village directory Barrow Signpost. Previously, we had a paper directory (also serving as a Welcome pack to new comers to the village) as well as a web directory. Pretty well all the new residents of the Willow Road and other developments have been given a Welcome pack stuffed with village leaflets as well as information about the web directory. Once we had used up all packs it was time to have a rethink.

We decided to abandon the paper directory because it was out of date before it was even printed. The old website had become out-dated too (not optimised for search; costly to have up-dated as it wasn't constructed on a content management platform). We have gained full funding to hugely improve the Signpost website so that you can find it easily even if you can't remember its name and so that we can all update it ourselves free of cost.

The project is now complete. The website is up and running and we invite you to visit it: www.barrowsignpost.info You will find it is a mine of easily retrievable facts about the village. It is a genuine directory with contact details, venues, opening times etc etc of our village organisations, services, facilities, businesses, clubs etc.

There is a lot that is NOT on Signpost and that is where the leicestershirevillages website comes into its own. The village website www.barrowuponsoar.org.uk has very much more detail, pictures, articles, records, reports etc. We are anxious to minimise the overlap of information between the two sites. It is not our intention for the Signpost to replace or compete against the village website; the two will complement each other by using various links. So think of Signpost as a simple directory and you won't go far wrong.

In the autumn we will be holding a launch evening for the new Signpost website. It will be on Oct 3rd starting at 7.30pm in Orchard Block at Humphery Perkins School. We aim to demonstrate what is on and what could be added and, most importantly, to encourage you to learn how to edit particular pages so that YOU can keep them up to date. We aim to have several computer terminals which you can use to play with the site and convince yourself that it is really easy to edit. This will be an especially useful session for community group members and for businesses.

### Malcolm Dark local author

alcolm and his wife Marjorie moved to Barrow in 1996. Being a narrow boat owner he wanted information on the local waterways. Finding very little he decided to write his own. The end result was nine books covering the area from Sileby to Normanton-on-Soar.

The writing didn't stop there. Malcolm has written a further eight books on a variety of interesting subjects ranging from The Barrow Riots, The Civil War at Cotes Mill, The Dakota Crash and others relating to the history of Barrow and its inhabitants. Not one to rest on his laurels, Malcolm is now working on three new projects. One of them is the effect that World War II had on Barrow. For instance, what was the impact on the village when nine thousand evacuees from the Sheffield area alone were moved into the Loughborough area? How many came to Barrow? How were they fed and housed? Malcolm is grateful for the recollections of some of the members of the Bishop Beveridge Club and other older residents of the village.


His second work in progress is about Ben Jones who lived in Malcolm and Majorie's house for 7 years in the 1980s. Ben was an equestrian gold medallist in the 1968 Olympics who moved in very high circles as he was a guest at Princess Anne's 21st birthday party and also had an invitation to the wedding of the Princess to Captain Mark Phillips. This book is primarily for the family of Ben Jones, but extracts



of it will be going into the forthcoming third work. This is a book about famous people who have lived in Barrow. Talking to Malcolm it is evident that this will not be the end of his prolific writing. He already has another book in mind which will be about Alfred Wykes, who lived in Cliffe House. Wykes was the man who developed and manufactured the Auster Aircraft, another very interesting subject. All of Malcolm's books can be obtained from the Paper Shop. They are printed in large clear type and priced at £3.50 each which is very good value.

In turn this has led to him write a book, *Halfway Gone: Life and Love after Stroke* about life in Japan and the very different life he has made for himself back in England.

#### Matt says:





### P/10/1518/2 JELSON HOMES PROPOSALS TO BUILD 300 HOMES ON LAND AT MELTON ROAD

The Inspectorate has confirmed that there will be a Public Inquiry on 9th, 10th, 11th and possibly 12th October in Loughborough Town Hall, starting at 10.00 am.

The Parish Council will have legal representation through a barrister in line with the other main parties to the appeal. Members of the public may attend the inquiry and, at the Inspector's discretion, express their views. Barrow Parish Council and BRAG urge you to support our objections by attending the Public Inquiry. If you are unable to attend the whole inquiry, your presence on the first day would very much help to give evidence of the strong local objection to Jelson's application.

### A week in China

hina: a nation drowning in Communism? A metropolis smothered by pollution? A beautiful land with a richly fascinating culture? This last description stood out to me in contrast with all I had heard about China as I entered a wonderfully air conditioned Shanghai hotel, the voices of my fellow De Lisle students murmuring excitedly around me.

After experiencing so many Chinese wonders from the 468 metre high Pearl TV Tower in Shanghai to the silk factory in Suzhou and to Tiananmen Square in Beijing, my modest week in China appeared to stretch into a period of several months. However, what will always rest at the very top of my memories will be the amazing opportunity to meet up with an old friend in Shanghai. Just a year before, family friend Ainia Dai graduated from Leicester University and returned to her home country. I never dreamed that we would have the opportunity to meet her and her mother, Lin, again so soon and the only pain in our reunion was that it was over far, far too quickly.

Shanghai is a funny city, I thought to myself, pacing the glass floor of the Pearl Tower. You see a single skyscraper and cannot see past its ugliness, but add a further 200 and a strangely beautiful urban forest emerges from the gloom. However, while Shanghai's curious charm will forever linger in my mind it was the lesser known Suzhou that stole away my breath. While still a gigantic city for the British, it is something of a village compared with Shanghai and filled with the exquisite Chinese architecture so admired by the west. A stroll in the iridescent Master of the Nets Garden soon tranquilises the mind as delicate reflections of sinewy boughs and resplendent archways dance across the surface of the shimmering water. Surrounded by nature in its purest form we began to learn the subtleties of Chinese calligraphy, an immensely complex, yet beautiful, form of art that has inspired me to accept the challenge of learning Mandarin.

Perhaps the most interesting experience was the opportunity to speak with a local resident of the Hutong district in Beijing who was happy to show tourists round her home and introduce them to her bilingual mynah bird. Having always lived in the same simple house, she will be able to call it hers for merely two more decades before the land is used for further skyscrapers.

And last but by no means least; the Great Wall of China. Although the entire wall stretches over 6,000 kilometres, today only small sections are open to the public. While the idea that it can be seen from outer space may be a myth, that is not to say it's unimpressive. The trek to the top begins with a pillar bearing the message 'The man who has not climbed the Great Wall is no true man' and so the pressure to reach the top starts to build. It wasn't easy; in places the steps are scarcely two centimetres apart, as hard as when they are sixty, not to mention the oxygen becoming thinner with each step. However, determination, perseverance and sheer refusal to give up meant that over an hour later I had reached the summit, tired but happy.

### Solving the mystery of Barrow's plank

bout a year ago the following saga began after a conversation between Bert and Iris Perkins and me, Sue Hobbs, at the Bishop Beveridge Club. It seems that one day Bert was sitting in his friend Alan Morgan's workshop watching him select a piece of timber. Bert noticed that the oak plank had some writing on it; an inscription followed by a list of Christian names. Iris suggested that it might be part of the 1st World War shrine from the corner of Church Street. At this point Alan was left in no doubt that his piece of oak was not to be cut up until its origins had been traced!

A visit to Trinity Church established that the names were not those from the Book of Remembrance and enquiries made amongst Barrow's Methodists, Baptists and Catholics were no more fruitful. Past members of the Working Men's Club and the Conservative Club couldn't recall the board either.

To spread the net wider in December 2011 Amy Watkins of the Loughborough Echo published an article asking for information about Barrow's mysterious plank, but none came. So Barrow Heritage Group contacted Liz Blood, War Memorial's Officer of Leicestershire County Council; one of her responsibilities is to keep a database of war memorials in the county. Unfortunately Barrow's mysterious board matched nothing in her records and an article in Branchline, a county journal, produced no links either. Undaunted Liz placed the board in an exhibition at the Bosworth Battle Field site. Although several people got in touch their information proved to have no connection with the board.

A possible clue was that one of the names on the board was Lamont. A search of the local and national 1901 and 1911 censuses revealed that there were seven Lamonts recorded between the ages of seventeen and fifty-seven but four were Scottish and none of them had obvious links with the Midlands. However, just as despair was setting in Liz Blood suggested asking the War Memorials Trust to help. Keith Chaplin photographed the board and with some clever photo-shop editing managed to reveal fragments of surnames. These pictures appeared on the War Memorials Trust website.



The story moves to Liverpool where Amanda Taylor was researching her husband's family history. In her father-inlaw's photograph album was a picture of a war memorial on which was the name William Noll, her father-in-law's uncle. Amanda went on to gather information about the other 62 people listed on the war memorial in the photograph and then went in search of the original which she discovered had been in the church of St. James in Toxteth, Liverpool. The name Lamont was on this war memorial- at last a connection had been made! It seems the church, founded in 1775, closed in 1972. Sometime between 1972 and its reopening under the new name of St. James in the City the church was broken into and damage done. However thanks to Amanda Taylor's love of researching family history the mystery of where the plank had come from was finally solved.

is a Liverpudlian) kindly offered to return the plank to Liverpool and the hand over took place on July 29th in the grounds of the Liverpool Anglican Cathedral which is very close to St. James' Church. Amanda was overjoyed to receive the plank from the war memorial and with the help of the vicar and the Diocesan network is planning to try and track down what happened to the remaining pieces and return the whole memorial to its rightful place



### Millennium Park leaflet

n the 1990's developers bought land and wanted to build a new estate off Fishpool Way but they were only allowed to do so if they gave a portion of it to the public for community use. People in the village set up a Millennium Group to raise funds to create an interesting and environmentally friendly public open space. Over the millennium year of 2000 an amazing £12,000 was raised through numerous events including a garden party, a river festival and a Last Night of the Proms. In 2002 the Parish Council acquired and adopted the land as a celebration of the Queen's Silver Jubilee. And that's when the space was given its name: the Millennium Park.

With an additional £20,000 from grants, the Millennium Group bought native wild flowers, trees and bushes, commissioned a giant sundial and information board and created the paths. They all enhance the park we know today. Village groups took part in the tree planting which got people really interested in the site. The park was formally opened in 2004.

The wild flowers sown or planted included primroses, cowslips and wild daffodils along the bank beside Fishpool Way and bluebells and snowdrops on the top side near to the bridleway. A summer wild flower meadow was created on damp ground near the Melton Road end of the park.

Various wild flower and other surveys had been carried out and in early 2009 the Parish Council and BUSCA decided to sponsor the Natural History Heritage Group to produce an illustrated leaflet to record the development of the park and its natural history. We are delighted that the leaflet has now been printed and is available for you to pick up free from the many dispensers around the village.

### Scope of the leaflet

The leaflet mentions only a small selection of plants, animals and other living organisms found in the park. You should be able to find most of these without too much searching. While we were reviewing the wildlife we found far more species identified and photographed than are included in the leaflet. For example, in 2002 a survey of the bank near the central steps identified over 40 species of wild flower.
